Vicar's letter

March is a month for change; days begin to get longer (thank goodness!) and the countryside begins to spring into life. As I write this letter the first signs of spring are already appearing in the rectory garden as the snow drops have been nodding at me and the daffodils are emerging into the early spring sunshine. The church calendar also moves on as we move into Lent. Just as the shops started displaying Christmas merchandise from early summer so too you can buy your Easter eggs before Lent has even started!! We often want to cut out the waiting and jump straight to the main event. But the time of waiting can be such a richly productive one. For many people Lent is associated with giving something up. It is seen as an opportunity, perhaps, for kicking that unwanted habit, for finally going on that long-intended diet, or for denying oneself those unnecessary extra luxuries. All such acts of discipline may have their place, but they give a very one-sided view on this season for, if anything, it should be about taking something on; committing oneself, in the manner of Jesus, to going the extra mile. That doesn't mean taking work on for work's sake, rather, it is about resolving to follow Christ more faithfully, a determination to give him our wholehearted discipleship. It might mean more disciplined devotion, perhaps more practical service, maybe more effective witness, or possibly the offering of previously unused gifts. Whatever it is, Lent encourages us to give something back to the one who gave us everything.

Consider today what Christ has done for you, then ask what you can do for him, and then use Lent as an opportunity to respond.

At the second meeting, the *Annual Parochial Church Meeting*, annual reports are given. There will then follow a meeting of the PCC for committee members only.

Bishop's Lent Appeal 2012 — Cambridge Street Pastors

The 2012 Bishop's Lent Appeal will be supporting Cambridge Street Pastors and their colleagues in Newmarket.

Alcohol-related violence and anti-social behaviour are among the top safety and policing priorities for central Cambridge. Most incidents, and many of the hospital admissions each year that result, occur in the 'night-time-economy' hours from 10 pm to 4 am.

Cambridge Street Pastors is an interdenominational Church response to these problems in Cambridge which was set up in 2009 with encouragement from police and local government officials. Street Pastors was started in the UK by the Ascension Trust and a number of groups operate across the UK. The Ascension Trust provide uniforms,

Guns, smoke and a storm in a teacup

On 31 January 1984 just before midnight I found myself plodding over a ploughed field just outside the village with a large gentleman and a small terrier, wondering what I had let myself in for. Jim Derbyshire was living alone next door to the Dovecot having moved out of a large mansion in Eversden follow-

ing a fire. Before Eversden he had been engaged on important veterinary work in Africa. He moved in top circles and was a regular quest at the Lord Mayor's Banquet. Even so, he was very friendly with us humble folk and often invited us round for tea and a chat. Both my wife Ann and Jim had been seriously upset for

some weeks by the proliferation of gas guns which our local farmers had gone in for in a big way to scare off pigeons. The birds just laughed at scarecrows, the farmers averred! Unfortunately, the gas guns were sited far too close to human habitation and there were too many in one area sounding off every few minutes. They were





supposed to stop after dusk but some did not. It seemed sometimes that Kingston was encircled and in the middle of a battle zone.

On the evening in question Jim called to say that he had endured enough and asked for my help to find and spike a particular gun which was making both his and Ann's life a misery. So, wrapped up and Wellington booted, we set off into the darkness complete with a torch and Jim's small dog. Jim did not wish to leave the dog alone in the house. Our course across the fields was, to say the least, erratic as we tried to head

in the direction of the periodic explosions. Not easy and made worse by the fact that the legs of Jim's little companion were not long enough to cope with the muddy furrows. Jim had to carry him and, after seemingly endless miles of fruitless struggle, he stopped in the middle of nowhere and protested that he could not go on! How we found our way back I'll never know, but certainly we never found the gun. Direct action and verbal people pressure eventually led to much tighter regulations and virtual elimination of the problem.

across the lane along which I was driving one day brought home to me the dangers of a long established practice of the farming community - namely the burning of stubble after the harvesting of crops. A hasty braking on my part and a similar action by another driver travelling in the opposite direction avoided a head-on collision, but it was a nasty moment. Ann, my passenger, was quickly out of the car to shout unkind words at the nearest of several fire raising individuals who were causing the problem. A common enough sight in arable country in those far off days was that of a

line of agricultural workers spread across a field setting light to heaps of straw as they advanced. Unfortunately, although farmers usually tried to operate when the wind was light and blowing in the right direction, they could not prevent the occasional capricious aust causing loss of control. Fire brigades were constantly rushing to put out blazing ricks, fences and outbuildings, not to mention the occasional thatched cottage roof. Road accidents or near accidents were commonplace, whilst many villagers were upset by the sight of black flecks of burnt straw floating gently down on

Children's Centres - sessions on cooking warm healthy meals for families with young children

Cambridgeshire Community Foundation – funding support for groups offering support to homeless people or those with mental health issues in order to boost their capacity to respond during cold weather

South Cambridgeshire District Council Boiler Servicing - Older people vulnerable to cold could be entitled to a free or reduced boiler service as well as the fitting of a smoke alarm and an advisory service through a crisis fund.
