Vicar's Letter

Rev Fiona Windsor

Did you know that the world produces enough food for everyone, but not everyone has enough food? Every day 1 in 8 people go hungry. That is the equivalent of the populations of the UK, and all the other European countries, the USA, Canada AND Australia, all going to bed hungry tonight.

In 2013 the UK is hosting the G8 Summit and so, many churches and organisations are running a campaign to ask our government to put hunger on the agenda at the G8.

The ENOUGH FOOD FOR EVERYONE IF campaign will focus on some of the root causes of hunger, recognising that aid is only a vital first step in tackling global poverty, and that we should go beyond it to the deeper causes of poverty and hunger, like climate change and tax dodging. During the year there will be campaigning actions on:

- Keeping Finance Promises. Asking our government to keep its promises to give 0.7% of GDP as aid, and with other rich countries, to provide the money they have already promised to help poor communities adapt to climate change.
- Land. Stopping companies and governments grabbing land from poor communities who can't prove they own it, and changing the EU biofuel target that makes land grabs more profitable and pushes up food prices.
- Tax. Stopping tax dodging by multinational companies, so they pay more tax in poor countries where they operate and poor countries' governments can spend it on tackling poverty.
- Transparency. Making the governments of poor countries more accountable to their people for how they use their budgets, and multinational food companies to be more accountable for their food stocks and food prices.

I am very proud to say that many of the Papworth Team churches will be taking part in this campaign leading up to the G8 summit and all churches have information packs available for you to use and read more information. It's and called Recipe for change and has cupcakes on the front cover. For more information you may find this website helpful www.tearfund/uf

Village Hall Upgrade Programme

THE GOOD NEWS - We gained planning permission in January this year and we have also secured some 40% of the total funding needed. Currently we are working to secure the remaining grant funding.

THE BAD NEWS - We need your help again! - Please do read on as your contribution is vital....

We have made a draft proposal to the Big Lottery; they can award up to £50K if they think the programme addresses real needs in the community. Success would pretty much secure the bulk of the funding. Although our plan to upgrade the Hall sounds sensible to them, they need more candid evidence about problems that currently exist in the community which a modernised village hall would address. We therefore are going to send out another questionnaire to seek your views.

The Big Lottery's interest is in backing projects that identify and resolve real problems in the community. Bricks and mortar are, for them, only a means to an end. The more isolated a community (indeed the more lonely and depressed the inhabitants, especially if the lives of children, elderly and the disabled are being negatively impacted by lack of facilities) the keener they are to help fix the problems.

The Lottery needs clear evidence that there are real issues for people in the community which the project can fix. We have made it clear in the application form that the community of Kingston is suffering from having an old village hall. Also we have indicated that the plans to upgrade the hall will make a tangible difference in the community. An upgraded hall will bring people closer together, provide opportunities for children to play, a comfortable place that is accessible and appealing to disabled/hard of hearing/older residents, and so on.

Feedback from the Lottery on our draft grant application indicates that what we are planning to do is generally the right idea, but we have not quite proved to their satisfaction the specific need in Kingston.

To stand a good chance of our application being approved, we need to prove the need for an upgraded hall, providing more hard evidence of problems for residents of the village that are caused by the present lack of an acceptable community facility.

To prove the need we need your help; we will be sending out a second questionnaire to everyone in the village to solicit more ideas to help make our application stronger. Please be sure to give us really honest feedback on what problems exist because of the current lack of an acceptable community facility. This will ensure that we are able to submit a really compelling application for this grant.

(We are also going to approach people that have recently moved away from Kingston to ask if, for example, isolation and a lack of facilities may have formed part of their decision to move away.)

This questionnaire is an opportunity for you to step back and consider any problems we all have because of the present lack of facilities. As a resident said to me when we were discussing the issue, "What tends to happen (because people are so resilient) is that one simply adjusts to the lack of acceptable facilities. After a while it all just seems normal to just climb into the car and take the kids to other villages, or get the bus to a place where you can sit and have a coffee or a beer in warmth, or one just gets used to not seeing people that often at all in winter because, after all, what sort of a place is there in Kingston to meet them in?"

Here's what the Big Lottery representative said to us: "Consultation that establishes how people feel is so important from the perspective of a funder that is trying to use its money to bring measurable improvements to the lives of people most in need. We don't always have enough money ... to fund all applications ... so we need to be sure that the projects we do fund are addressing real need. One can construct an academic argument... but that will not be as persuasive to a decision-making committee as a finding of loneliness and depression [in the community] based on consultation."

Please have a good hard think and be really candid in filling out the questionnaire. We understand they can be a bit of effort to fill out, and we are very grateful for your time. If we can focus on the issues caused for you and the community by the lack of a decent village hall, then we will be able to put a strong set of grant applications together.

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Easy Spaghetti Carbonara Recipe

Cook strips of bacon until crisp, drain fat and crumble the bacon into bits.

Cook spaghetti, drain, place back in pot. Place pot on stove burner with a low heat.

Break a raw egg (or two if you're making it for more than two people) and add to the hot pasta, stir until the egg is cooked (looks like scrambled eggs).

Sprinkle a bit of olive oil along with a dash of salt and pepper over the pasta, add a knob of butter and stir it in.

Add crumbled bacon along with some grated Parmesan cheese and mix in.

Just before serving, sprinkle a little more Parmesan cheese on top of each plate of spaghetti along with a garnish of fresh parsley.
