Vicar's Letter

One of the greatest scientists of the early 20th Century, Niels Bohr - the first to put forward a theory of the atom based on quantum mechanics – once said “Prediction is very difficult, especially about the future.”

The opinion pollsters have just learned this lesson the hard way when the outcome of the General Election was radically different from their predictions. Tragically, too, our inability to predict earthquakes leads great loss of life, most recently in Nepal.

Knowing how easy it is to get predictions wrong never seems to stop us, though. Even before summer has really begun, meteorologists are predicting that we will have a hard winter based on observing ocean currents in the south Pacific Ocean. Vast amounts of money are made (and lost) in the world's financial markets by people who are basically attempting to predict what will happen to the price of commodities, or the level of interest rates.

So why should we take the Bible seriously when so much of it seems to consist of predictions?

But Biblical prophecy is not about predicting the future, it's about reading the present. It doesn't say “this will happen, I have foreseen it”, like the Emperor in Star Wars, instead it says “this will happen *because...*” or “this will happen *unless...*”.

When I say “if you keep crossing the road without looking, you'll get run over” I don't have to see the future, just look at what's happening in front of my eyes, and apply my mind.

So the Biblical prophets, like Amos, had a lot to say about the corrosive effects on society of those who “trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land, and practise deceit with false balances, buying the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, and selling the sweepings of the wheat.”

It was obvious to Amos, and it's obvious now, that if a society allows the rich and powerful to do whatever they want, and doesn't look after its weaker members, it's heading for disaster.

So whatever your views on politics or religion, now is the time to put pressure on our Members of Parliament to govern for *everyone's* good so that we will see (as Amos also wrote) “justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.”

Parish Council News

Kingston Annual Parish Meeting: by law, the parish council must meet in May each year and elect its Chairman and other officers. This meeting was held on 13 May, and Tim Fitzjohn has been re-elected as chairman. This is the (unchanged) makeup of the parish council:

New transparency code: Under new legislation designed to increase democratic accountability, small bodies such as parish councils are now required to publish more detailed information on their website. The information being published includes a summarised version of the previous year's accounts, a list of all items of expenditure exceeding £100, an explanation of any significant changes in key figures from the previous year, a list of parish councillors and their duties, and a list of parish council owned land and buildings.

In time this will replace the routine annual external audit as it is envisaged that the new transparency rules will enable members of the public, particularly local council tax payers, to access relevant information about the parish council's accounts and governance and hold them to account.

This information will shortly appear on the village website:

www.kingstonvillage.org.uk. Look under the 'Parish Council' tab. Kingston Parish Council has a policy of being open and transparent, so much of this information was already published or otherwise available under its Publication Scheme.

Workday: We will hold another workday, this time at the recreation ground, on Saturday 6 June, to carry out a few maintenance tasks. Please come along (in your wellies if it's wet) with a pair of gardening gloves, a spade or shovel, a wheelbarrow (Crane's Lane only), and a short trowel or similar for weeding. Meet at the Recreation ground at 10.00am.

Village greens and verges: a team of volunteers spent several hours on a recent Saturday morning repairing some of the damaged verges in the village. Could we please ask everyone to keep vehicles off these verges, particularly while the new grass is growing, and particularly in or after wet weather when the ground is soft.

Please also do not park vehicles on village greens, and request your visitors to do likewise. We realise that there is a lack of parking space in the village, especially at the moment with the work on the village hall, but it is possible to park vehicles fully on the tarmac in areas where the road is not too narrow.

Village Hall cleaning: we are again looking for someone who could clean the village hall and bus shelter once per month. Please contact me for full details if you are interested or know anybody who is.

Planning:

- **S/0321/15/FL Kingston Studio** (The Old Chapel), Church Lane: the parish council initially objected to this proposal because of lack of parking space. The proposals have since been modified by the applicant to include an off-road parking bay, and permission has been granted.
- **S/0985/15/LB The Old Farmhouse, Tinker's Lane:** a retrospective application has been submitted to carry out various minor repairs to interior walls and ceilings.
- **C/11/40/056 The Old Rectory, Rectory Lane:** an application has been submitted to carry out tree work.

Our May Day concert in the church was a great success. There were so many unknowns before we started. Could we get the group to come out to Kingston? Could we attract an audience? Could we provide toilets and parking? What would the acoustic be like? What was the seating capacity? Did we have enough chairs? Could we have the interval before the concert?!

On the night, everything went swimmingly and exceeded even the eternal optimist's expectations. We had a capacity audience from near and far, all found a seat and the acoustic turned out to be excellent. The Gesualdo Six loved the church and used the acoustic to full effect by singing in different places. The first half was mainly renaissance spiritual music by Tallis, Tomkins, Sheppard, Monteverdi and Gesualdo and the blend of voices soared around the church.

The second half was more modern and experimental. The Ligeti Nonsense Songs are fiendishly difficult to sing but were delivered superbly. The singers' diction was very clear and we were able to pick out every word. The final piece was a “Fantasia on Nursery Rhymes” by the group's director, Owain Park. Familiar melodies were mixed with clever harmonies to produce an excellent composition.

This was the first concert outside Cambridge for The Gesualdo Six. However, they discovered just before the concert that they had been accepted as Young Artists at St.John's Smith Square, giving them three concerts there in the next year.

It was both a privilege and a pleasure to be able to share the music, the group and the church with so many people and I am sure that we will be able to repeat the experience. Many thanks to all who supported this event.

Enjoy a literary June at Wimpole

Calling all bookworms, poetry lovers and wannabe wordsmiths – or just people with young children who like to be entertained! The beautiful month of June will see the first ever literary season at Wimpole.

On Wednesday 10th June from 6pm -8pm in the Saloon, we are celebrating the connection between Wimpole and Rudyard Kipling. In the first part of the evening historical raconteur Geoff Hutchinson will entertain you with his first-person performance of *Kipling: His Life and Verse*. This will be followed by a talk and Q&A session from Gary Enstone, the Premises Manager of Kipling's home Bateman's, also now in the care of the National Trust. **Adult tickets £17 to include a glass of wine, child tickets £6.**

On Friday 19th June at 4pm, National Trust Libraries Curator Mark Purcell will be bringing us his illustrated talk “National Trust Libraries: A Grand Tour”. Having seen Mark speak before, I can personally recommend his engaging and animated delivery. The event takes place in the Book Room. **All tickets £10 to include a glass of wine.**

Children won't be left out of things either. **On Sunday 21st June at 11.30am and 2pm in the Great Barn at Home Farm, theatre company Dot and Ethel will be performing Gorilla Gardening, an interactive play for young children aged 3-7, adapted from Emma Howell's poem.** Using poetry, puppetry and song, the show aims to encourage young people to get outdoors and closer to nature by imagining gorillas as undercover horticulturalists. The audience will become active participants in the narrative and together with the performers will tell jokes, be silly and sing songs. **This event is free but donations are welcome.**

And if all this talk of things literary inspires you to wield the pen yourself, why not try our **outdoor creative writing workshop Sunday 28th June from 10am to 5pm?** The workshop will be led by professional writers Helena Attlee and Emma Beynon and takes place in the **parkland and garden** here at Wimpole. There is also a unique chance to leave a piece of your writing as part of Wimpole's collection (optional)! **Tickets £60 for the day. Tea and coffee will be provided.**

Kathleen Irene Burnell 1925 – 2015

Kathleen Irene Hemmings, known simply as 'K', was born on the 28th June, 1925, at Winchmore Hill in North London. She attended Winchmore Junior School where she was in same class as her future husband, James Burnell. Her further education took place at Minchenden Grammar School in Southgate, followed by teacher training at Hockerill College, Bishop's Stortford, in 1945, and a Diploma in Biology at Chelsea Polytechnic in 1950. She went on to teach biology and music at various schools in Tottenham and at Fanshawe School in Ware.

K was musical from an early age, learning the piano, and later studying the organ with Prof Richard Popplewell of the Royal College of Music (who played at her wedding). She enjoyed singing and was the star chorister in the Winchmore church choir. Music was to remain central to her life. She was a good all-rounder: she played tennis and hockey for her school and became a Girl Guide Captain.

K married James Walter Burnell in 1951 at Holy Trinity, Winchmore: he was a naval officer during the war and then an accountant. They moved to Nazeing in Essex, and thereafter to Broxbourne in Hertfordshire in 1959. They had four children, named – perhaps an early example of K's idiosyncrasy – after characters from the *Morte D'Arthur*: Gavin (Sir Gawain), Gaynor (Guinevere), (Sir) Gareth and (Sir) Geraint, known in the family as G1, G2, G3 and G4 respectively. K was devoted to her family, which grew to include 8 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren, encouraging them all in their education and interests, but demanding the highest standards of achievement.

The Burnells came to Highbank in Kingston in 1982. Jim devoted his retirement to community service, becoming Treasurer to Kingston Parochial Church Council, to the Kingston Village Hall Charity, and to Kingston Neighbours' Group; a Scoutmaster with the 1st Bourn Scout Group; and the founder of the Kingston Players, producing memorable Christmas pantomimes. K supported Jim in all these endeavours but did not seek public office herself.

K had always drawn and painted and she started an art group in Kingston, which met regularly for many years in the Village Hall or at Highbank. The group



attracted members from several local villages besides Kingston and their meetings were convivial occasions with wine, tea and homemade cakes.

K's was a strong character and she was not afraid of speaking her mind. She did not suffer fools gladly and could be surprisingly unconventional in her views. Like Jim she disliked pretension and incompetence, and had no great respect for rank or status. She was always cheerful, always with a smile and a ready laugh. Her nature was generous. She was a great correspondent, particularly with family members, but also with anyone she had dealings with: she never forgot to send letters of thanks.

Jim died in 2008. K suffered with poor health over many years, but she was stoical and uncomplaining. In 2013 she went into Richard Cox House care home in Royston where she died on February 5th this year. K's funeral service was held at All Saints and St Andrew, Kingston, on the 27th February, conducted by the Revd Paul Gildersleve, with tributes from all four Gs, followed by interment with Jim in the churchyard.
