Vicar's Letter: Knowing who we are!

The question of identity is prominent and under scrutiny in many arenas. For individuals and people groups, it can include questions such as "Who am I ..." and, "What factors should prevail in conclusions we arrive at?"

For example, it is close to the heart of whether Northern Ireland should be known as 'the north of Ireland' or 'Ulster'; it affects how children may be treated at home and in school; it is generating a lot of (often heated) debate among sports participants.

In truth the complexity of some aspects and unacknowledged pain felt by some people caught up in these debates has often been ignored rather than faced up to. One of the spin-offs in the 21st century is discussing these things should encourage us all to be more careful in how we address one another; and, as a result, to think through some areas of behaviour that may have been unchecked for too long. If this produces a more caring and thoughtful culture, this has to be a good thing, in my view. If, on the other hand, it prevents us talking and exploring questions or crises of identity simply for fear of causing offence, this will be a bad outcome. It's good to talk!

We may think Christianity has nothing helpful to inject into such conversations. I disagree! I am not suggesting a quick reading or consultation with the Christian's Bible will give categorically clear answers to all questions and issues arising from discussions about identity in the 21st century. But I do think we need to make sure we are starting from the right place.

If we are ready and willing to open the Bible, we find ground zero for human identity starts with how we came into being. Christians believe God made us and, as a result of what is commonly known as The Fall, we were robbed of that capacity to relate well to God. The good news is this can change. Christians believe also that through Jesus and what his life and death achieved, we are offered the equivalent of a new passport and certification that alters our status: from creatures God made, to children God has joyfully embraced into his family.

My point is this: if and when we enter the fray on matters of identity and do not take account of our creator and his rescue plan for us, or refuse to give the topic the healthy air-time it deserves, we risk going off (or shooting our mouths off!) in ways that lead us into cul-de-sacs of confusion, disappointment and where more unnecessary hurt is caused.

When we can say 'Yes God made me, has unlocked a way to rescue me and unleash my full potential as a human being...' we can begin to allow other powerful feelings and opinions to find their place and be reconciled rather than being forces that, unchecked, dominate perspective and some behaviours in ways that divide us or cause harm.

What a Waste!

A recent report by the British Fashion Council found 23 million returned garments were sent to landfill or incinerated in the UK last year – generating 750,000 tonnes of CO₂ emissions.

The off-road Cambourne to Cambridge (C2C) busway has been delayed because of the **Environment Agency's objections** to the thousands of new homes the route will support due to concerns over water supplies. Cambridgeshire County Council was due to seek permission from the government to start building the £200million busway last year but now an application to the Department for Transport is not expected until later this year, meaning scheduled completion of the busway is delayed by a vear until the end of 2027. The C2C scheme has been developed over eight years, but has met with opposition due to the environmental impact and proposed felling of trees at Coton Orchard.

Village maintenance – Rainwater Drainage Ditch Maintenance

At a recent Parish Council Meeting we discussed the role of the various rainwater drainage ditch and pipe systems within the Village and their ongoing maintenance, as it has been brought to our attention that standing surface water has been causing a few issues on roads and lanes at times following periods of heavy rain.

The County Council has been contacted to request work be undertaken for the clearing, and or repair, of certain underground rainwater drainpipes. These are the ones that they have a responsibility for, at locations within the Village.

As a parish council we are required to follow the Notices issued by Cambridgeshire County Council which are clear on the question of responsibilities for rainwater

drainage ditches. In brief, amongst other wording they quote that, under Common Law in most cases, the responsibility for ditch maintenance rests with the adjacent landowner. This therefore means that we will not receive any assistance from Cambridgeshire County Council to support drainage ditch maintenance within the village.

We would therefore ask residents to look at the rainwater drainage ditches that run adjacent to their properties and clear any overgrown plants, weeds or soil build up that might have accumulated over the year, to ensure that water collecting in these ditches is able to drain easily. This will greatly help us to manage standing surface water in the Village.

Did you know that soldiers were so enchanted by snowdrops that they brought them back from the Crimean War battlefields to plant in their own gardens?

Anglesey Abbey has one of the finest snowdrop collections in the country with 400 varieties, many rare and some discovered locally. The Winter Garden is in its prime at this time of year. The specialist collection is only accessible as part of a guided tour: Monday - Friday and every Sunday throughout February. Tours are free, but a £5 donation is welcome. Pre-booking essential at



Do I have to come along every week?


We know that appointments, sickness, family commitments and such can get in the way! Just come along when you can.

musicians the opportunity to play the musical instruments they want to play, where they want to play them (at school or home, in a private music lesson or professional ensemble). Any deficiency to an upper limb, thwarts playing a musical instrument to a reasonable standard. It means that thousands of people — whether through a condition of birth or later life (e.g. stroke, arthritis) — are excluded from music-making.

Eliza is an example of the musicians that OHMI help. Eliza's grandmother contacted the charity after treatment for a brain tumour caused a one-sided weakness. This meant that Eliza couldn't play along with her peers at school. OHMI were able to provide a one-handed clarinet, made by

Peter Worrell in Norfolk, through the OHMI Hire Scheme. Eliza's mum wrote a thank you letter to the charity saying.

'Eliza is loving playing her clarinet. She is getting on so well and was chosen to play in assembly this week and has also been asked to join the school orchestra. The sound quality of the clarinet is amazing. OHMI has opened up a whole world of possibilities that we thought had been closed off to Eliza. She is able to play an instrument just as well as her peers and gets so much enjoyment out of it. We are so so so so grateful! I can wholeheartedly say that OHMI is the most fantastic charity to support and is one which makes such a direct and immediate positive impact on people's lives. Music brings so much joy and to be able to make this gift accessible to people to whom it would not otherwise be accessible is just so so wonderful."

Have Your Say on the Future of Local Housing

Residents, businesses and local organisations are being asked to help shape the future of housing across Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire in a consultation which runs for six weeks from Monday 22 January until 4 March 2024, and gives an opportunity to influence the strategy before it is finalised in the summer.

The Housing Strategy for Greater Cambridge has recently been reviewed and sets out a vision for the next five years which promotes healthy, safe, affordable and sustainable homes where people of all walks of life want to live.

The proposed housing strategy will help guide housing affordability, the planning of new homes, improvements to the quality, safety and condition of existing homes, and helping people who need additional support to remain at home. It focuses on four key themes:

Building the right homes in the right places that people need and can afford to live in Providing high quality, low carbon, energy and water efficient homes

Enabling people to live settled lives

Building strong partnerships

South Cambs Council is pledging to deliver at least 375 new council homes during the next five years, undertake a stock condition survey of all existing council homes to produce a 15-year plan for their improved energy efficiency, and continue to deliver a cost-of-living support programme, including increased money advice support.

Council Review of the Treatment of Weeds on Highways

Following concerns raised last summer by residents and local councils, Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways and Transport Committee is being asked to adopt new standards that could see weeds being treated twice a year. If agreed, a further engagement exercise will be carried out to seek views on the new policy.

Cllr Alex Beckett, chair of the Highways and Transport Committee, said: "I know we didn't get this change right, which is why I asked for a review of the policy. While some communities really appreciated the reduction in chemical weed killing, a large number did not. Local decision making is important, we have listened to that feedback and hope these new changes, if approved, will allow those communities who wish to continue without chemical weed killing to do so whilst allowing those who preferred the previous regime to go back to that."
