## Back to the Future

Time can often move in a strange way. Some days and weeks drag, while others are over in a flash. An event from last week can seem like ages ago, while a conversation from 10 years ago can seem as fresh as yesterday. Over the next couple of months our calendar is punctuated with occasions which encourage us to look backwards and forwards in time. This broad sweep of past and future reminds us that we belong to a people and a world which is much greater than our individual experience of it. Now is not everything, it is only a moment in time; we are not everything, but we are links in the continuum of human existence.

November is a time for looking back and remembering the past – the feasts of All Saints and All Souls on November 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> encourage us to remember and give thanks for the saints and for the good examples of all Christians who have gone before us, including our own beloved family and friends who have died, perhaps very recently. Remembering them helps to keep our own connections alive and strengthens our own identities. We will be holding a short service of remembering in Bourn Church on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> November at 6pm at which we will remember by name all our loved ones who have died. Everyone from the community is welcome to come to this and if you would like a friend or relative's name included, please let me know.

On November 5<sup>th</sup> we remember a very specific occasion when Guy Fawkes nearly destroyed Parliament. We remember this partly because it was a daring plot which has captured our collective imagination, but also partly because it acts as a warning: it was a narrow escape from catastrophe, which had come about through intolerance, disempowerment and fear. It is a warning of the dangers which can ensue when those in power seek to eliminate their opponents, and when those who are disempowered become so obsessed with their cause that they lose touch with reality.

On Remembrance Sunday (this year 10<sup>th</sup> November), we remember those who have died in war, particularly service men and women killed in action in the two World Wars, but also all who have lost their lives due to global conflict. We remember with gratitude the sacrifice they made that we might enjoy our current freedom.

But the end of the month sees a dramatic change of perspective. As we move into December we enter into the season of Advent. This is a time of preparation, of expectation, looking forward to the astonishing gift of Jesus at Christmas time. It's strange that we should look forward to an event from the past. But of course, for Christians, Christmas is not merely a historical memory or tradition but an occasion to celebrate God's continuing presence in the world and intimate involvement in our human lives.

And it'll be here before we know it!

## Parish Council News

First Responder: you probably know that First Responders are often the first on the scene at a medical emergency such as a heart attack, and through prompt action, may save a life whilst waiting for the ambulance. We have no such scheme in this area, but a local scheme covering several villages including Kingston is being organised. Start-up funds are being raised (the Parish Council is contributing) and a small team of volunteers is needed as First Responders. Training is provided. Please consider if you could be a first Responder! More details on the separate advert in this issue.

Parking: we have had several complaints about inconsiderate parking in the village. We know that parking space is at a premium, but please consider your neighbours when you or your guests park. In particular we ask that vehicles are not parked on village greens, which are a pleasant visual feature of our village, intended as a public amenity. If you do not have space on your own premises, the village hall car park can be used as a temporary parking place.

Millennium photo album: an album has come to light containing a number of photos and documents relating to the creation of the millennium tapestry (which hangs in the village hall) and also some cuttings from the Cambridge News of articles around that time, all with pictures of various Kingston residents – many of them, alas, no longer with us. # COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDER SCHEME

## HELP us save lives!

Do you have a current driving licence and access to a car?

Are you physically fit? Over 18 and under 70?

Are you caring and tolerant?

## Come and join the team

We are looking for caring energetic people to join our Caldecote, Toft and Kingston First Responder Scheme.

We need First Responders to volunteer a few flexible hours a week to attend local emergencies.

No previous medical background is needed as full training will be given

by East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust.

We also need fund raisers and event organisers to help raise awareness and funds to keep these schemes alive.

### Why we need your help?

It has been recognised that sudden cardiac arrest claims around 150,000 lives each year in the United Kingdom, with survival rates being around 5% outside of a hospital setting.

If a person's heart has stopped due to an accident or heart attack and is in rhythm called ventricular fibrillation, the only way to get the heart into a more regular sustaining beat is to pass an electrical

charge through the heart muscle. The first four minutes are the most vital for the collapsed person and if FIRST AID and a DEFIBRILLATOR are on hand, then the chance of survival will increase considerably. (For every minute after 4 minutes survival chances decrease by 10%).



The types of calls you will be asked to attend are life threatening emergencies such as heart attacks, chest pain, cardiac arrests, fits and breathing problems. You will not be asked to attend dangerous incidents such as road traffic accidents, fights or childbirth. An ambulance or paramedic will always be dispatched to the incident and will take control as soon as they arrive. In the meantime by your actions you may have saved a life!

**Currently, there is no FIRST RESPONDER TEAM covering CALDECOTE, TOFT or KINGSTON  
The Founding group goes live on the 1<sup>st</sup> November 2013**

### Editor's Note:

In last month's magazine a story appeared under the title "Seventy years ago – A nightmare in Norfolk". Unfortunately, due to a formatting problem in production, the name of the author was obscured in the printed version. We would like to apologise to our contributor for this error and he has kindly submitted another story of reminiscence this month for your enjoyment...

### A Cautionary Tale

After a few months on ambulance duties as an R.A.F. medic in "Blighty" I found myself on a troopship on my way to Sierra Leone, West Africa although most on board were at first convinced we were heading for Burma. I was, in fact, posted to R.A.F. Aberdeen to serve on an Air, Sea Rescue launch based just outside Freetown.

In November 1944 I was temporarily sent to a camp called Lungi, a lonely emergency air strip in the bush. My job was to relieve a Corporal Allen who was running the sick quarters there and had been given a short period of leave. This involved a short flight in a small single-engined American plane, which I believe was called an Argos, to the opposite side of the wide river estuary by which Freetown stands.

My uneventful spell at Lungi was almost at an end and, on the afternoon before the day I was due to return to base, sounds of distress drew me outside the sick quarters hut. I found an African, serving with the West African Air Corps, supported by two fellow servicemen. For a startled moment I thought one of his feet had developed gangrene; not being well up on what gangrene looked like. On closer examination I saw that the foot was covered in a smelly mixture of green, slimy mud and semi-rotted leaves! I gleaned, with difficulty, that my would-be patient, one Alifa Dombeya, had sustained injury in a fall and had received initial attention from the local witch doctor.

I hastily urged one of the companions to wash off the horrid concoction, being reluctant to touch it myself, and eventually a swollen and discoloured ankle was revealed. It was either badly sprained or possibly fractured. After giving what limited treatment I could, I performed what I fondly considered to be a textbook application of a clean white supporting bandage.

My patient was assisted away in a seemingly happier state than when he had arrived, having been instructed to report back at 9:30am sharp the following morning in order to be flown back in the Argos for hospital treatment in Freetown. The plane duly arrived on schedule and Corporal Allen disembarked with various stores. The pilot had indicated that he was anxious to return without delay and I was waiting impatiently on the airstrip, but there was no sign of Alifa. I was about to climb aboard without him when he emerged from the bush, supported by the same two mates, his foot covered by a smelly mixture of green, slimy mud and semi-rotted leaves!!

My explosive reaction was met with the truculent response – “White man medicine no good boss - African medicine plenty good!”

In November 1994, fifty years later, almost to the day, my ankle turned suddenly, for no apparent reason, whilst I was walking along a rough track in the Chiltern Hills. Result - a very bad sprain!!

Was the spirit of that witch doctor trying to tell me something???

## From The District Councillor

### **SCDC Local Plan Consultation**

The consultation has now ended and the Council states it received “around 8000” responses. The responses are now being processed and anyone who submitted a response either online or on paper should receive an acknowledgement. The Council expects the responses to be available to view online by the end of November, and does not expect to make any decisions on next steps until the New Year.

Thank you to everyone who sent in a response. We now wait to see what the administration will do, particularly with respect to the Bourn Airfield Development. I would encourage everyone to read the StopBAD response here at <http://bit.ly/StopBADdoc> - it makes for interesting reading. My response to the consultation can be found at <http://bit.ly/TH-LDP1310> and includes comments about Bourn Airfield and Bennell Farm proposals.

It would seem that some developers have proposed alternatives to Bourn Airfield but we should find out more over the coming months.

### **A14 Improvement Scheme by Highways Agency**

The consultation by the Highways Agency has also ended. There has been a lot said in the press about increasing opposition to the idea of implementing a toll section from Swavesey to Ellington, and I tend to agree that there should be no toll on that route and the government’s statement that the alternative would be the A1-A428.

I submitted a response which you can find at <http://bit.ly/A14Response1310> , in which I reiterated the need for the A428-M11 a movement to relieve congestion on the A1301 Madingley Road, removal of toll or limiting what local people pay, and the dualling of the A428 from Caxton Gibbett to St Neots – in the light of the SCDC local plan proposals. As I wrote in my blog at <http://bit.ly/CCCA14Blunder>, I think Cambs County missed an opportunity here to help residents living in the villages along the A428 corridor.

### **Community Awards**

The District Council likes to give awards, as opposed to grants which it has now cut, but that is another story. The new awards being launched soon are Village Hero, Young Village Hero, Community Pride: Local Services Award, Community Pride: Environmental Award and Community Pride: Health and Well being Award. Details will be on the website soon. Toft was well represented last year and came second in two categories, so time to start thinking about likely nominees!

### **Superfast Broadband**

The saga continues.....Following on from my report last month, the information on the ‘My Area’ roll-over map on [www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk/parish/kingston](http://www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk/parish/kingston) has been updated. It shows that Kingston is expected to get superfast broadband sometime between September 2014 and September 2015, and it is likely to happen in stages.

Meanwhile Cambridgeshire County has secured over £4.6m extra funding to enable a programme to offer a countywide package of support to hundreds of small and medium sized businesses. Work has already begun on setting up the new support for business scheme which will be launched in January 2014 and is expected to offer match funded grants and one-off payments for eligible companies to upgrade their connections and invest in digital technologies.

Be sure to say that you belong to Kingston Oil Club. You won't have a contract with Kingston Oil Club or with Agricole. Agricole is a broker only, and will pass your order on to the cheapest supplier that day and confirm the details via letter/email/fax, to avoid any confusion/misunderstandings before delivery. You will pay the supplier direct, pre-delivery for the first order, but the supplier will reduce your bill to reflect the fact that you are being given the volume discount. You can stop using Agricole at any time.

Why is it cheaper? It is not always better to have a long-term contract with one supplier. Oil prices fluctuate daily, and daily 'spot' prices are generally cheaper. It pays to shop around each time you place an order. Agricole does this for you!

Can I have an arrangement where a supplier gives me an automatic regular top-up? Again this means one supplier, and so this is not the cheapest option.

How many members are needed to make this viable? No minimum. The whole point is that Kingston members' orders will be bundled in with those of other Agricole clients.

Charitable aspect: Agricole is paid by the suppliers who give it a small commission on each order (the commission is small enough that the householder still keeps practically all of the savings). Out of its commission, Agricole makes a donation to Kingston Oil Club of £5 per active member per year ('active' means the member has placed at least two orders over 500 litres). Kingston Oil Club passes this money on to the Parish Council, which uses it to support village projects – this is a way of passing a small bit of the savings back into our community.

What are the catches? There don't seem to be any! Membership is free and you can leave at any time without penalty. This is a community club designed to save its members money, and take the hassle out of ordering oil. That's all.
