Vicar's Letter

A couple of weeks ago, I climbed a volcano – fortunately, the main risk was sunburn since the volcano in question has been extinct for many thousands of years. It's called the Puy de Dome and it's 1500 very steep metres to the top. For the less athletic, there's a train! Some people, when they reach the top, jump off! They are paragliders – using their brightly-coloured canopies to catch the updraughts, they can actually gain height before descending, and get a very long way from the mountain.

For a fee (quite a large one!) some of the paragliders will take a customer down with them. The passenger is strapped in front of the paraglider, and over the edge they go.

The paragliders must have great faith to jump off the volcano – not some mystical 'religious' thing, but faith that their equipment is up to scratch, faith that their own skill is equal to the task, and faith that the other paragliders around them are taking care to avoid collisions. Those who choose to ride pillion have to have all this faith, and more besides – they are not just taking their life in their own hands, they are placing their life into someone else's. They must have faith that the other person really does intend to see both of them safely to the bottom of the mountain.

The word "faith", when used in a religious sense, has gathered a lot of 'baggage' around it, which unfortunately hides its real meaning – that is, simply, "trust". Christians trust that God really is how Jesus revealed him to be – a God of love and forgiveness. Christians trust that Jesus, by dying and rising again, has dealt with our human imperfections and opened the way into God's eternity. Christians are those who strap themselves to Jesus and leap into life, trusting that Jesus is willing and able to see them all the way to a safe landing.

A reminder about Kingston Oil Club

This is an opportunity to get the best price for your heating oil with someone else doing all the hard work. The scheme is already operating in other villages near here. By operating as a club, each year we receive a small commission (£5 per member) which is used to support village projects.

How does it work? To order your next oil delivery at the best price, contact:

Be sure to say that you belong to Kingston Oil Club. You won't have a contract with Kingston Oil Club or with Agricole. Agricole is a broker only, and will pass your order on to the cheapest supplier that day and confirm the details via letter/email/fax, to avoid any confusion/misunderstandings before delivery. You will pay the supplier direct, pre-delivery for the first order, but the supplier will reduce your bill to reflect the fact that you are being given the volume discount. You can stop using Agricole at any time.

Why is it cheaper? It is not always better to have a long-term contract with one supplier. Oil prices fluctuate daily, and daily 'spot' prices are generally cheaper. It pays to shop around each time you place an order. Agricole does this for you!

Can I have an arrangement where a supplier gives me an automatic regular top-up? Again this means one supplier, and so this is not the cheapest option.

How many members are needed to make this viable? No minimum. The whole point is that Kingston members' orders will be bundled in with those of other Agricole clients.

Charitable aspect: Agricole is paid by the suppliers who give it a small commission on each order (the commission is small enough that the householder still keeps practically all of the savings). Out of its commission, Agricole makes a donation to Kingston Oil Club of £5 per active member per year ('active' means the member has placed at least two orders over 500 litres). Kingston Oil Club passes this money on to the Parish Council, which uses it to support village projects – this is a way of passing a small bit of the savings back into our community.

What are the catches? There don't seem to be any! Membership is free and you can leave at any time without penalty. This is a community club designed to save its members money, and take the hassle out of ordering oil. That's all.

John David Wade 1914 – 2013 R.I.P.

David Wade was born in Cardiff on the 2nd May 1914, the eldest of four boys. His father, James Wade, was a surgeon who, after the First World War, had become an honorary consultant at Cardiff Royal Infirmary, but who worked mainly in the miners' hospitals of South Wales, such as Pontypridd, Caerphilly and Mountain Ash, where he would often carry out 15 or 20 operations at a time. The four boys' familiarity with medical practice dated almost from infancy and, by the time they were teenagers, they were accomplished anaesthetists and were assisting with operations. Remarkably, all four sons – David, Larry, Owen and Tom – made distinguished careers for themselves in medicine.

David and his brothers were educated at Repton, presided over by Geoffrey Fisher, later Archbishop of Canterbury. The slightly younger Reptonian, Roald Dahl, famously detested the school, but David's experience was happier. He then went up to Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Like his friend and Cambridge contemporary, Philip Gell, David was much affected by the inter-war Depression and the rise of fascism. He asked his father for permission to go to Spain to support the Republicans: this was refused. He was less interested in the theory of Marxism than Philip, who became, for a while, a convinced communist. David was one of a number of Cambridge medical students who gave assistance to the Jarrow marchers.

David began his career as a Houseman at Cardiff and then secured a post at University College Hospital, London. When war was declared he volunteered for the Royal Auxiliary Medical Corps and served as a regimental medical officer with the 51st Highlanders. According to his brother, Owen, "He was known as 'Happy' and was distinguished by his unmilitary appearance and his unique method of saluting". David was near Dieppe when the Germans advanced into France: ordered to evade capture, he proceeded by bicycle, train and tram to St Malo and thence on the last vessel back to England. He was transferred to the Indian Army and posted to Iraq and Italy.

In 1943 David was serving in a field hospital at Bari in Italy, where he met Agnes Summerfield, a theatre sister in the Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service. Agnes was born in Khartoum in Sudan (her birth certificate gave her tribe of origin as English), the daughter of a Scots telegraphic engineer. They were married in Edinburgh in 1946 and had three daughters: Rosemary (Rosi), Hilary and Susan.

After the war David became a thoracic surgeon at Edinburgh. He was involved in the development of prosthetic heart valves and was one of the first cardiac surgeons to practice in the U.K. The Wades were devoted to family life. Agnes was the homemaker: she was an outstanding cook and hostess. Holidays invariably involved outdoor activities: walking, camping, skiing and sailing. David was an indulgent father. On their first holiday in Brittany he was persuaded by his daughters to drive to Spain, Italy, Switzerland and Holland so that they could collect dolls from each country.

David and Agnes moved to Throckenholt in Crane's Lane in 1978 in order to help care for their eldest daughter, Rosi, who had become seriously ill with a brain tumour after moving to Comberton with her husband Mike Lamont. Rosi sadly died in 1984. Despite this very difficult beginning, David and Agnes were to enjoy a long and happy

retirement in Kingston. By coincidence they found themselves living next door to David's old friends Philip and Susan Gell at Wychwood.

In retirement David took a number of general practice locums on distant islands: Vanuatu in the Pacific; Montserrat in the West Indies; and St Helena in the South Atlantic.

The Wades had always enjoyed sailing. With his son-in-law, Tom Gledhill, David built their 36-foot ocean-going yacht, Arianwen, in the front garden at Throckenholt. They made many voyages around the UK and to France and Holland with family and friends. It wasn't always plain sailing: there were various bumps and scrapes, which always made for good stories in retrospect. On one occasion, well into their seventies, David and Agnes found themselves being swept out to sea when the outboard motor on their dinghy failed.

Agnes died in 2001. She had always taken care of domestic arrangements, but David was very practical and coped with this loss. He became an ambitious cook with Delia Smith as his guide. He read widely and continued to travel; he kept up to date with his medical journals; he took neighbours as guests to college functions at Emmanuel; and he continued the tradition of hosting family gatherings and parties. The celebrations for his 95th birthday were especially memorable. He took a close interest in his 10 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren.

David was proud that his school had produced three of the 20th century's Archbishops of Canterbury, but daily compulsory chapel at Repton turned him off organised religion. He perhaps found this world too absorbing to reflect much upon the next. He occasionally came to church in Kingston and his daughter, Hilary, was married here. The Wades enjoyed Kingston's Neighbours' Group events: it was invariably David who asked the awkward questions of the guest speakers.

David was un-self conscious and always himself: he would talk with anyone and, if English failed, he would try French, German or even Latin. He possessed a child-like, insatiable curiosity and a tremendous sense of fun. He was without guile or malice: an optimist who saw the best in people. David's company was always a pleasure and he will be greatly missed by his family and his many friends, not least those here in Kingston.

Becoming increasingly frail, David left Kingston two years ago and then stayed with his daughters alternately: Susie in the fens and Hilary in Cumbria. More recently he went to Queen's Court Care Home in Bottisham where he was suddenly taken ill and died in Addenbrooke's Hospital on 15th June 2013, aged 99. Following his cremation, there was a Service of Celebration and Thanksgiving at All Saints' and St Andrew's, Kingston, on the 28th June. The Revd Dr Alexandra Clarke officiated; Hilary Wade and Major Katie Lamont gave tributes; Emma and Abby Wade-Gledhill read Edwin Muir's poem, *The Way*; and Robert Wade read from 1 Corinthians, Chapter 13. After the service David's ashes were interred with those of Agnes in Rosi's grave in the churchyard of St Mary's, Comberton.

From The District Councillor

This summer has been busy, and I hope that you've all had a chance to have a break and get some rest and relaxation. The big issue for our ward over the coming month are the two on-going public consultations on the draft new development plan and the transport strategy.

Consultation on draft new Local Development Plan

The Bourn Airfield Development (or BAD) as it has come to be known locally, is generating a lot of discussion and so it should. I have written a number of blog articles that attempt to make sense of the mountain of reports that have been generated for this plan and focus on the main issues and. You can read the latest article at <http://bit.ly/LDPCon4> and it will signpost you to other related articles.

By the time you read this, you will have heard that the consultation period has been extended to 14th October 2013. Why? It is because the council made a mistake in the process. It claims that the updated SHLAA which was published in July 2013 did not include all the latest information on sites that was relied upon when the Local Plan was at its final stages of drafting. Therefore, calculations made by the public on the building density for BAD was higher than the council's own figures.

The council will now publish a slightly revised SHLAA which will be available by the end of August. It claims that "the Local Plan which is currently out for consultation was compiled using this latest information and therefore these updates have no effect on the number of homes proposed or where they should be located". That is missing the point completely, which is that the public did not have the opportunity to comment on the new data before the council used it for its plan making. The plan making process is therefore seriously flawed, and the council in my opinion, will need to go back to the drawing board – or withdraw Bourn Airfield from the plan.

To try and rectify their mistake, SCDC have decided to extend the consultation period to 14th October, so that people wanting to comment on the Local Plan have easy access to the new information that was used to select BAD.

The StopBAD campaign www.stopbad.org.uk against the proposed new village has gained significant momentum with residents from several villages in the area signed up and participating. Several people have indicated their displeasure at the proposals, and with this latest SCDC blunder together with the lightweight transport strategy being proposed, I would urge you to sign up to the campaign to get updates on its progress and participate as you are able. To join, make a donation, or for information on the StopBAD campaign, email info@stopbad.org.uk. To ease transfer of information, you can email your village contact at toft-rep@stopbad.org.uk.

The next public exhibitions showing the draft plan take place from 2.30 to 7.30pm at Caldecote Village Hall on Tuesday 3 September and Bourn Village Hall on Friday 6th September 2013.

This is the last chance to make our voices heard and we need to do so in large numbers to get the council's attention. There is now a strong chance that choice of BAD can be reversed as there are valid issues on which to challenge it. The council has also agreed to simplify the response form following pressure from StopBAD. Each member of the family should send in a response on separate forms. A copy of the response form will be included in the SCDC newsletter being distributed at the beginning of September and you can make copies for each member of the family. Additional copies will also be available to collect from the village shop, or from SCDC reception.

If you require help in completing the form, please let me know or contact your StopBAD village rep at kingston-rep@stopbad.org.uk or visit the Form Filling Help Session taking place on 7th September in Toft, or 10th September in Caldecote. Forms can also be submitted by handing it to your village rep, or at the Toft and Caldecote shops where they will be collected, to be hand delivered to SCDC.

Consultation on Transport Strategy for Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire

The County Council is preparing a new Transport Strategy for Cambridge city and South Cambridgeshire in parallel with the South Cambridgeshire and the Cambridge Local Plans. The draft strategy is looking at ways to improve transport in Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire up to 2031, and it affects the viability of the proposed Bourn Airfield Development.

As I've written in the article at <http://bit.ly/tsCSC13>, my main concern is that the strategy does not include any proposal to increase road capacity, but plans to cope with the increase in demand on the travel network by trying to force people from their cars to use public transport and to cycle and walk. It does not address the road restrictions on the A428/A1303 in any meaningful way, and already there is a shortfall in the cash for road infrastructure from central government. The model used to predict the increase in traffic is also very suspect indeed!

The county consultation is taking place at the same time as the local development plan and county officers are expected to be at the south cambs exhibitions to explain and take questions from members of the public.

Please respond to this consultation as well, as it is imperative we let the County council know what we think of their strategy. If you have read my blog article, you already know what I think of it!

Connecting Cambridgeshire

The detailed planning for the first phases of the broadband roll-out is making progress but there is still no word about when our villages will get connected.

Connecting Cambridgeshire is committed to openness and transparency, therefore are planning to release information about the delivery phases of the roll-out with the launch of a 'My Area' roll-over map and A-Z places list in September 2013 on the Connecting Cambridgeshire website at www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk. This will help people to find out how their parish/area fits in to the multiple phases of the broadband roll-out plan and will be updated regularly as the programme progresses.
