

## Vicar's Letter –

Recently, Oxfam produced a report which said that during 2016, the top 1% of wealthiest people in the world will have net wealth greater than the other 99%.

The net wealth needed to be in the 1% is currently a bit over 500 thousand pounds: it sounds a lot, but even a moderate house in this area, if it's not mortgaged, puts its owners in the 1%. And that includes me.

Of course, lots of people dispute the statistics, and the way Oxfam is interpreting them - certainly, having a 'valuable' house is not the same as having a lot of money to spend.

But it's still a sobering reminder of the inequality in our world, and how well off we are in this area.

The Bible in general, and Jesus in particular, has a great deal to say about how we relate to money (far more than about sex!) Being wealthy as such is seen as a sign of God's blessing, but greed, selfishness, dodgy-dealing, and being more concerned about money than about people, are all condemned in the strongest terms.

God's concern is for justice, uprightness, and taking care of those who can't take care of themselves.

By the time you read this, we will be in the season of Lent – a time when many people give up something as a form of fasting in preparation for Easter, but perhaps there's a better way.

Through the words of the prophet Isaiah, God puts a question to us:

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?

This Lent let's take God seriously and spend time thinking how those of us who know ourselves to be wealthy can do more to help the oppressed, the hungry and the poor. We will find it a much more rewarding fast than giving up chocolate!

## Margaret Mellor 1915 – 2015

Margaret Mary Davidson was born on the 9<sup>th</sup> of September 1915 in West Hartlepool, County Durham, and was very nearly a centenarian when she died on the 2<sup>nd</sup> January this year at Fornham St Martin, near Bury St Edmunds. Her parents were Scots who purchased and ran a chicken farm near Hartlepool. She had one sister, Kathleen.

Margaret was expected to help with the farm work from infancy, but she went to Hartlepool School of Art where she met fellow student, Charles Mellor: their courtship was difficult, closely supervised by her strict parents. In 1945 they married and moved to Boston, Lincolnshire, by which time Charles had qualified as a Chartered Loss Adjuster: here their daughter Elizabeth was born. The Mellors came further south to Roseford Road in Cambridge in 1957, Charles by now a successful partner in a King's Parade insurance firm. Ten years later they arrived in Kingston, moving in to Tollfields, one of three new houses built by Mr Starr in Crane's Lane. They immediately immersed themselves in village life.

Charles and Margaret were born and bred Anglicans and had worshipped at Holy Trinity in Cambridge. They both joined Kingston PCC and Charles was elected churchwarden in 1968. The Mellors were instrumental in founding Kingston Neighbours' Group, which provided social events of all kinds for decades until very recently; they introduced a new format Church and Parish Magazine, which continues; they inaugurated annual Horkey (Harvest) suppers; and they gave wonderful Christmas parties for the church congregation.

Margaret was involved with the local Girl Guides and became House Chairman and Treasurer of Cambridge Abbeyfield Homes. She excelled in arts and crafts: embroidery, knitting, painting, and drawing. We have two examples of her work here in Kingston: the heraldic altar kneelers (designed by Charles), which she worked with the late Pamela Cartwright; and the crib and nativity family and animals, which we still bring out each Christmas.

Charles and Margaret retired in 1985 to Highbury Fields, Islington. Keen students of architecture, they delighted in their Georgian terraced house, which they shared with Elizabeth, son-in-law Henry, and grandson, Alexander. They joined Christ Church, Highbury, and made new friends. Born with a weak heart, Charles' health deteriorated and he died, aged 74, in 1994.

Both Margaret and Charles were larger than life: they were activists who believed in getting things done. They were opinionated, at times outspoken. Margaret was especially sociable and was a loyal and generous friend, keeping in constant touch by phone and correspondence with a wide circle to the very end of her life. With Charles she shared a devout and robust Christian faith, which amounted to far more than weekly attendance at church. Privately they offered practical help of all kinds to people of their acquaintance in need or trouble. Every day Margaret remembered the church and people of Kingston in her prayers.

Margaret spent her last years in Fornham House Residential Care Home in Fornham St Martin. She often looked back to her years with Charles in Kingston as the happiest of her life. She continued to receive, and to read avidly, our magazine, and was visited by Kingstonian and other friends. Her funeral took place at the parish church on 27<sup>th</sup> January: the service was conducted by the Revd Mark Haworth, Rector of the North Bury Team, assisted by the Revd Tania Witter.

## Solar Eclipse on 20 March 2015

**The deepest solar eclipse since 1999 will take place on March 20 2015, and we won't see another like it until 2026.** In the UK, it will begin at about 8.30am, peaking at about 9.30am before finishing at 10.45am.

Further north the eclipse will be total – covering the sun entirely – but the Faroe Islands and Norwegian island Svalbard will be the only populated places on Earth where it can be seen in its full darkness. Scotland will see over 95 per cent coverage but the eclipse will get less intense in places further south, though even London will be see about 84 per cent coverage.

There won't be another total eclipse until 2090.

**It's important** never to look straight into the sun. If you do, you can permanently damage the back of your eye. The same warnings apply to the lens in your camera. There is a video on different ways to watch the eclipse safely and what you can expect to see at <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PHxtFIRjRYg&feature=youtu.be>

Energy groups have voiced concerns about the power supply, given the increased use of solar energy, especially in Europe. Energy companies have plans in place to try and avoid this.

A total eclipse of the Sun can happen on Earth because, although the Moon is about 400 times smaller than the Sun, it's also around 400 times closer to the Earth, so its disc can completely fill the disc of the Sun and cause a total solar eclipse. However, the Moon is currently moving away from the Earth at a rate of 3.8 centimetres a year, which means that around 563 million years from now, the Earth will experience its final total solar eclipse as the angular size of the Moon becomes too small to cover the solar disc.

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
## Graffiti in Kingston Church

Kingston was in the national news at the end of February when Norfolk and Suffolk Medieval Graffiti Survey volunteers, who use torches and digital cameras to reveal faded marks that are almost impossible to see, discovered ancient graffiti below the limewash of the Church walls. Among other inscriptions are the names of Cateryn, Jane and Amee Maddyngley.

Cateryn, Jane and Amee Maddyngley belonged to a family of tenant farmers who lived in Kingston. They died in 1515, probably of bubonic plague. It is likely that they were children as their names do not appear as adults in any records. Records reveal the Maddyngleys had lived in Kingston since at least 1279.

In 1515, there was an outbreak of bubonic plague in London which spread across south east England. Children were particularly hard-hit and usually hastily buried in unmarked graves.

It is thought that those who could not afford plaques or statues expressed their loss through wall inscriptions and writings.
