Parish Council News

Annual Parish Meeting 19 May: the meeting this year will take place at 8.00pm in the Village Hall on 19 May. This is a **public meeting** – not a Parish Council meeting – to which all Kingston residents are invited, to air your views – and hear the views of others – on matters that are important to us. Come along and enjoy a glass of wine and have your say!

This year the format of the meeting is changing slightly. In the past, various reports have been presented – from the Parish Council, the Village Hall committee, the Parochial Church Committee, and several others – on their past year's activities. This is followed by an 'Open Forum' at which matters of general interest can be raised by anybody and openly discussed.

This year no reports will be presented at the meeting. Reports will be published in advance of the meeting and will be available on paper or electronically to anyone who wants them. The reports' authors will be at the meeting so that they will be available for any questions, or to inform any discussion that may arise. The usual 'Open Forum' will follow.

The whole meeting is likely to be shorter, with more time available to talk about matters of general interest.

Litterpick 16 April: we will be carrying out our regular clearing of litter from the roads leading into and through the village. Please come along with your wellies or boots, and a pair of gardening gloves. Hi-vis waistcoats available. Children welcome if accompanied. Meet by the village hall at 10.00am.

High speed broadband: there has been some encouraging movement on this touchy subject. It appears that the promised survey by Openreach to determine the best way to deliver faster broadband to Kingston as actually under way, and we have been offered a meeting with Connecting Cambridgeshire, which we are hoping to arrange before the end of March. More news next month.

New litter bins: work has started on replacing our old litter bins with a new type which can be used for both normal litter and dog waste. By the time you read this we hope that all three new litter bins will be in place (two near the crossroads and one at the recreation ground).

Speeding through Kingston: at the 3rd attempt we have finally been successful in our bid to have speed humps installed at the north and south entrances to the village, in an effort to reduce the speed of traffic passing through the village. We have requested one hump at each location, of the flat-top kind so they should not be too harsh on motorists who are observing the speed limit!

News Update from Bourn Primary

The Spring Term, the shortest of the year, passed very quickly. Once again we were fortunate with the weather and suffered no closure days due to snow.

Children throughout the School have been fully engaged in their curriculum and 'enrichment' topics, which have included a study of the Tudors, a Pirate theme entitled Sloops and Spyglasses, life since the 1950's and, in Class Acorn (the Reception class), trying to find their beloved class bear who was lost when on holiday in Budapest at half term!

World Book Day was celebrated in style, with the majority of staff and children dressing as their favourite book character. Activities in the classrooms throughout the day were all planned to further embed the children's love of books and reading.

International Week was a highlight of the term. Among other things, many parents and friends came into school to share their knowledge and experiences of other countries and the evening event (Bring



and Share) was extremely well attended with parents providing a wide range of international cuisine to be shared by all.

The pedestrian gate has now been fitted with an electric key pad in order to monitor access during the school day. As can be the case with many new initiatives, the entry system has been causing us some problems but we are determined to make it work effectively.

Work to refurbish the changing rooms is taking place during the Easter break, all funded by the BSA and, in particular, by the proceeds from Bourn to Run. The children will hopefully be swimming in the school pool at the start of the Summer Term.

The BSA Quiz night held on 4th March was extremely well attended and raised a fantastic £650 for the School. The questions were quite challenging and it definitely brought it home to me how children must sometimes feel when questioned by the teacher in class!

In the final week of term, our annual Easter Activity Morning took place, with a large number of parents assisting the children in making Easter crafts. The following day the whole school visited the Church for an Easter Service.

Looking forward to the Summer we have lots of exciting things planned: Year 4 and Year 6 residential trips, class day trips to a variety of locations, sports afternoon, Bourn Proms and much more. Our new Reception intake will shortly be coming for their first visit and sadly we will be preparing to say goodbye to our wonderful Year 6 pupils.

With 203 pupils on roll we have nearly reached capacity. However we do still have a few places remaining in certain year groups. Dodle trees

In reply to The Old Fellow (March *Magazine*, p.5), I have some first-hand information on dodle trees (pollarded elms) gained during my teenage years on my uncle's farm in Caxton End and at Clare Farm in Caldecote. Sometimes dodle trees stood around the outside of a meadow or farmyard garden. Or they may be grown in two or three rows, planted about 14ft apart, on the west side of a field running parallel to the boundary. They were grown to shelter stock from the prevailing wind and rain from the SW and to provide shade in the summer. They were also grown as a crop and harvested as and when wood was required for firewood (the thicker branches), for stakes and pea sticks (the smaller branches) and also for faggots (bundles of brushwood for kindling). These bundles were tied up with hemp or wire, both being by-products from bales of straw or hay. After pollarding new growth would be rapid as the trees were already well established.

1816: Prints by Turner, Goya and Cornelius at the Fitzwilliam Museum, Gallery **16**

Exhibition runs until 31 July 2016

A look at three series of prints by major artists published in 1816, the year of the founding of the Fitzwilliam. The period was known as 'The year without a summer' due to the after-effects of the 1815 volcano eruption in Indonesia. Global cooling, volcanic ash, darkness, crop failures, food riots and spectacular sunsets influenced artists and writers of the time. A variety of responses can be seen here with Goya's *Tauromaquia*, books eleven and twelve of Turner's *Liber Studiorum*, and Peter Cornelius's large-scale *Illustrations to Goethe's Faust*.

Emmaus, hope for the homeless, celebrates 25th birthday in Cambridge

2016 is a landmark year for Emmaus Cambridge, situated in Landbeach, just off the A10, on a site that was originally two derelict barns. Emmaus helps homeless people by giving them a home, meaningful work and a return to self-respect.

In 1991 Emmaus Cambridge welcomed companions into the Landbeach community for the first time, kick starting the work of Emmaus in the UK. Over the years, the community has grown and there are presently 38 companions (the name comes from the French word *compagnons*), three of them women, as well as a furniture emporium and cafe.

25 years on, not only is Emmaus Cambridge still thriving but the movement in the UK has grown; there are now 27 communities providing a home, support and meaningful activity to some 700 companions across Britain and 350 based in 36 countries across the world.

Being homeless is not just about a lack of a roof, it's much more. Those who have been homeless often lose their self-confidence and feel isolated from society. Access to training for employment, education, support services and a place in society is so often denied to those who are on the street or vulnerable in some other way and Emmaus is very much about making that access possible. Many of

those coming to Emmaus to live and work have mental health problems. The GP surgery at Waterbeach offers support for them and detox help for those who've used drugs. Community members can access a debt relief programme and are offered driving lessons, and established companions get support if they want to follow educational courses.

Emmaus in Landbeach offers between 50 and 60 people a year the opportunity to live in their community and learn the skills involved in running a retail business such as driving, customer service, selling and Portable Appliance Testing. There is also the opportunity to improve literacy skills and take the time to work through any issues in a supportive environment. Companions are expected to work for 40 hours per week, or to the best of their ability, in in what has become a successful and self-sustaining social enterprise collecting and selling people's surplus goods, and are required to sign off all benefits except housing benefit, which is claimed to help to support the community. Research shows that for every £1 invested in a community, there is an £11 social, environmental and economic return, with savings to the benefits bill, health services and a reduction in crime. The community model has a huge impact on restoring self-esteem as companions take responsibility for keeping their community going, working to support themselves and others.

The community also offers work experience to youngsters with special needs.

The Landbeach community makes a significant contribution to keeping things out of landfill: customers buy in the region of 420 tonnes of previously-owned household goods a year, which would otherwise have ended up in landfill. Landbeach's turnover this year from sales of donated and refurbished goods is now up to £1m.
