

Vicar's Letter

They say a change is as good as a rest. Then again, they say change is stressful. The truth is somewhere in between: change is unsettling, and too much change can be bad for us, but change is also necessary because to live is to change.

Each of the cells in our body is constantly changing a whirl of molecular activity – arriving, departing, building, dismantling. Scientific studies show that 98% of the atoms in our body are replaced every year, so physically we are literally not the same people as we were a year ago! It's a whirl which only stops when the cell dies.

As a whole person we change, too – growing, learning, loving, losing, gathering experience and (we hope) maturity.

Communities change as people come and go, and relationships change as the people involved grow together, sharing some experiences, and bringing others from elsewhere.

Churches change, partly because they are communities, and partly because the Good News of salvation in Jesus the Christ must be translated afresh for each new generation.

Of course, change can be good or bad, so it's up to all people of goodwill to work at making change positive. Fortunately, the teachings of Jesus show us how to do this! If we are always looking for ways to love our neighbours as ourselves, it will change our communities for good. If we are always seeking God's guidance, we will negotiate changes in our own lives in the best possible way.

My own bit of upcoming change will be at the end of February when I hand over the parishes of Papworth Everard, Graveley with Papworth St. Agnes, and Yelling, to the Team Rector, and take on the Parishes of Bourn, Caxton, Kingston and Longstowe. It will mean letting go of some things, and seeing a lot less of some people. It will mean learning lots of new names and faces (though I already know many people in my 'new' parishes), and eventually moving house.

In all of these changes, I'm confident that God is leading, and that whatever the challenges ahead, the outcomes will be to God's glory.

Appointment of new architect

The PCC has appointed Nigel Walter of Archangel, based in Impington, as our new church architect (following Brian Page's retirement last year) and look forward to working with him and his team in the future. His first task will be the Quinquennial Inspection of the fabric, due this March.

Broadband for Kingston – Problems and Progress

We all know the frustration of the message on the screen “*insufficient bandwidth, try again later*”. The broadband service in Kingston can be summed up as simply “not fit for purpose”. Fortunately there is a glimmer of hope on the horizon: a lot of effort is now being made behind the scenes to bring improved broadband speeds to the local area.

Cambridgeshire County Council is a partner in an ongoing project called Connecting Cambridgeshire (<http://www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk/>). The promise was that government money would be used to bring superfast broadband to areas that were deemed “not commercially viable”. It was intended that by the end of 2015

- more than 90% of homes and businesses will be able to receive superfast broadband speeds of 24 Mbps upwards
- a minimum of 2Mbps to 24Mbps will be available to very nearly 100% of premises
- 98% of the county can expect to get fibre-based broadband
- harder to reach premises will be connected through alternative technologies like satellite and wireless

As we know to our misfortune, none of these goals have been achieved for Kingston.

What went wrong?

The suspicion is that BT, the commercial partner in this venture, concentrated on the ‘easy to reach’ areas, to enable them to fulfil their contracted obligation of 90% of premises. Some villages now have the luxury of a choice of both cable and phone–line superfast broadband. Slowly, it is now being recognised that those left behind in Phase One of the project are not just a handful of isolated dwellings as was initially suggested would be the case, but whole communities, like Kingston.

Superfast broadband depends for the most part on fibre optic cables being brought to a street-side cabinet, and then normal telephone copper wires run the rest of the way to the house. Unfortunately for Kingston our nearest cabinet is in Toft. By the time the ‘superfast’ broadband service reaches Kingston there is not much speed left.

We (your Parish Council) have been pushing hard to ensure Kingston is not overlooked in Phase Two of the project. We have been raising this issue not only with Connecting Cambridgeshire, but also with our MP Heidi Allen, and directly with BT at regional level, lobbying for a solution that addresses our needs.

The latest news I have is that BT will carry out a technical survey and feasibility study for Kingston before the end of March this year. One solution being considered is to install a street-side cabinet in Kingston. Usually this is done by installing a fibre optic capable cabinet next to and connected to an existing copper based one. As we don't currently have a cabinet, we would need a new style one that incorporates both fibre optic and copper technology. However this is just a 'maybe'; it is possible an alternative solution will be found. (What that might be though has not been explained to me.)

Unfortunately there is not much more we can do at present while we wait for the results of the study. More news as soon as I have it!

Snowdrops at Anglesey Abbey

Anglesey Abbey has one of the finest snowdrops collection in the country with over 300 varieties of the delicate white flowers, including 20 varieties that have been discovered at Anglesey Abbey.

The snowdrop, or *galanthus* to use its correct botanical name, is often seen growing in religious or monastic sites because of the coincidence to the period of the Feast of Candlemas & Purification each February. Their true origin can be traced across the world to Southern Russia, Turkey and Southern Europe. It is widely believed that the first great plant hunters, the Elizabethans, introduced them to this country.

The mild winter has meant that many of our early flowering varieties are in flower a good 3 weeks earlier than usual, but we should have fantastic displays right through to the end of February.

If you are inspired to start your own snowdrop collection, we have over 60 varieties for sale in our Plant Centre.

Fairtrade Fortnight * 29 February - 13 March

Sit down for breakfast, stand up for farmers!

As Martin Luther King said, 'before you finish eating breakfast in the morning, you've depended on more than half the world'. The people who grow the food we take for granted can't always feed their own families. A Fairtrade breakfast supports these farmers and workers to provide for their families. When people are paid a fairer price, they can have more control over their lives when times are hard, and worry less about how they will feed their families. Fairtrade means many farmers and workers are able to ensure the people they care about have enough good food to eat all year round.

Stand by sugar cane farmers

Generations of sugar cane farmers and their families in African, Caribbean, and Pacific countries depend on the UK and other European countries buying their sugar. Their access to our markets has been shielded by the EU capping the amount of sugar grown in Europe. A change to EU trade rules is going to get rid of this cap, and with it the safeguarding of sugar cane farmers' livelihoods. Unless the EU ensures the support it is providing reaches the farmers who need it, to help them sell their sugar to new markets, diversify away from farming or set up supporting projects, many will be plunged into poverty. A celebration of contemporary calligraphy, letter carving and fine printing.

One of the Cathedral's greatest treasures is the Liber Eliensis (Book of Ely). Hand-written in the twelfth century, it chronicles the history of Ely Abbey from its foundation by Aethelthryth (St Etheldreda) in 673, through the establishment of the bishopric in 1109, to the early stages of the re-building of the cathedral before the end of the century. Monastic Ely was a vibrant intellectual centre more than a hundred years before the first of the Cambridge Colleges came into existence.

From its beginning, carving words into stone has marked the fabric of the cathedral: medieval mason's marks, elegant funerary inscriptions spanning nine centuries, and graffiti including those of allied servicemen stationed nearby during the second world war. The history of Ely is quite literally inscribed in its cathedral.

By the end of the fifteenth century Cambridge was better placed than Ely to take advantage of the invention of printing, as multiple copies replaced the painstaking process of hand-written transcription. Cambridge University Press is the world's oldest publishing house. In 1591 it published the first Cambridge Bible and for four centuries has shared only with Oxford the privilege of printing both the Book of Common Prayer and the Authorised Version of the Bible. John Baskerville, who became the University Printer in 1758, was a talented calligrapher as well as a carver of inscriptions who gave his name to one of the most enduring of English type faces.

This exhibition links the past inscribed in the fabric of the cathedral with a present in which letters cut, written and printed flourish around us. It features the work of William Morris who established his Kelmscott Press to reform the art of fine printing.
