## Vicar's Letter

A few weeks ago, you may have seen a photo of a black hole. Of course, it was no such thing. By very definition a black hole can't be photographed – its gravity is too strong for even light to escape.

As material falls into it, though, that material gets heated up, and shines. But it isn't light as we can see it – it's radio waves with a wavelength of 1.3mm.

And it wasn't collected by a sensor like in an ordinary camera. Instead eight radio telescopes, spaced all round the earth, recorded the minute variations in those radio waves as they scanned the tiny distance across the distant galaxy where the black hole lies.

Then the vast amounts of data those telescopes generate were combined using a specially developed computer system to generate the final image.

So it's what we would see if our eyes were as big as a planet, and sensitive to very high frequency radio waves. It's a triumph of human ingenuity – a 'photograph' of something which it is literally impossible to see.

But that's perhaps easy compared with the idea of seeing God. Mostly the Bible tells us that we can't see God, though some people caught a glimpse. Usually they were completely overwhelmed by the experience, but now there's a better way.

The New Testament describes Jesus as "the visible image of the invisible God" and Jesus himself told his disciples "anyone who has seen me has seen the Father". If we want to know what God looks like, we just need to pay attention to Jesus. It's a picture our broken, hurting world desperately needs to see.

John – one of Jesus' original twelve followers – went even further. He wrote "no one has ever seen God. But if we love each other, God lives in us, and his love is brought to full expression in us." In other words, there's no need for an array of radio telescopes or massive computer resources: if we live with love for our neighbour - and for our enemy – then even we can show the invisible God to the world around us.

## **Eulogy for Christopher Edward Osborne**

Christopher Edward Osborne was born on 27th March 1964. He was the eldest of Terry and Valerie's two children. His sister Nicola appeared a couple of years later. He grew up in the heart of the country with both sides of the family being part of the farming communities of the villages of Kingston and Toft. Valerie was a farmer's daughter but Terry had begun life in London. It was the advent of WW2 and the tragic death in battle of Terry's father Edward that led to Terry and his mother Nell coming to Toft. Nell went on to marry Ralph Collett, a farm worker in Toft and Terry gained two brothers and two sisters. Terry grew up and began to work for Valerie's father Cyril Miller on his farm here in Kingston. They married and then Chris arrived in the world.

Chris's childhood was happy. He was very fond of his grandparents, particularly his Grannies. His Kingston Granny Joyce played the organ in the Baptist Chapel in the village where Christopher was baptised. Perhaps it was with her that he gained his sense of respect for church and religion.

His Granny Nell in Toft with her large brood would provide legendary Sunday teas. Legendary not for their culinary delights, Terry bluntly described his mother as 'a rotten cook'. She was particularly renowned for her heavy-handed production of a weekly batch of jam turnovers. Chris's Grandad Ralph had one each day for his "dockey" (packed lunch) and he had to resort to feeding the leaden pastry to the dogs. But Nell was generous and would load the table with anything and everything that she could lay her hands on. In those days tins of peaches and salmon were luxurious and exotic foodstuffs.

Chris went to Bourn Primary School and then on to Comberton Village College. He was bright and showed academic promise but it was during his time at CVC around the age of 13 that he began to manifest the symptoms of the serious mental health problems that were to be with him for the rest of his life.

Chris spent periods in Fulbourn Hospital and in the care of the mental health team in Cambridge. His illness affected not only himself but also his close family and all those who knew and loved him. Terry spoke movingly of how it felt to leave his son in the hospital and drive away. Accepting and adapting to this new reality was very difficult for everyone. Chris was fortunate to have a loving and stable family and parents who were willing and able to support him in whatever way they could. Finally Chris settled in his flat in Cambridge in East Street close by the Grafton Centre, as Valerie put it, very convenient for the shops and many takeaways that Chris so enjoyed. He loved living in the City and built up a life within his local

community forming long term close friendships. He had supportive neighbours and was well known and liked at his local corner shop.

In his childhood Chris had played rugby and cricket for CVC and cricket at the Eversden Cricket Club. He would fetch his cousins Andrew and Susie from next door in Kingston to play cricket and football on the back lawn of his house. They would all wear Arsenal football club shirts as it was Granny Joyce's favourite football team. On one occasion Chris managed to break the toilet window at the back of the house with a cricket ball. Thankfully this was met with great hilarity, not always the case in the aftermath of such events. Terry remembered taking Chris to Wembley once. At one time the family had a season ticket to Cambridge United and Chris would go with his sister Nicola and his cousins.

Sport remained the great joy of Chris's life. His football team was Manchester City which had a phenomenal season this year winning the Treble: the League Cup and Premier League before Chris died and the FA Cup after he was gone. He supported Lancashire Cricket Team. Being a traditionalist Chris liked Test Cricket best and would keep the score as the matches progressed.

Among the many beautiful cards Valerie and Terry received following Chris's death was one from a very long term friend Phil. In it Phil expresses with great affection the qualities of the man who was his lifelong friend. It is addressed to Chris's Mum and Dad, sister and the Osborne family and I would like to read it to you.

## 'Just to say:

I was pleased to be one of Chris's friends of which I was one of many. Chris was a kind, generous and very giving man. He opened his door to lots of people, some of whom took advantage of his good nature, but Chris was never vindictive, was very forgiving, I think his own struggles with mental health gave him that empathy he showed to others. I got to know Chris in the early days when we were in a band, I was the singer and Chris was the drummer and we remained friends ever since. He will be sorely missed.

R.I.P Chris From Phil'

Like all of us Chris's life was shaped by his family and the environment into which he was born. Like each one of us he had to play the game of life as best he could until the final whistle blew. It would seem that he had a peaceful death in his own home in his own bed which gave his parents some consolation. He had a group of friends and neighbours who kept him company, shared his interests and gave him support. He lived in a place he loved. As Phil said in his lovely card he will be sorely missed.

Whatever Chris or we may believe about what lies beyond this world we can confidently say he is now at peace joining his beloved grandparents and all those who have gone before. Earlier this summer on a hot, sunny day with clouds scudding across the sky I found myself in a lovely London park with my niece and her 3 year old daughter. The little girl was lying on the grass looking upwards through the leaves of a tree at the clouds racing by. She pointed upwards and cried out she could see a dragon in the clouds. Not long after this event I read a luminous description of how death looks and I quote:

'The meeting and parting of living things is as when clouds having come together drift apart again, or as when leaves are parted from trees.'

In this beautiful description lies the inevitable truth that we all must part and go into what Tolstoy described as 'the solemn and simple mystery of death'. The Christian faith talks of a cycle of living, dying and rising again. It is into this cycle of hope that we let Chris go as we say farewell to him today.

I would like to end this appreciation of Chris's life with some words written about 170 years ago by the poet John Clare. Like Chris, Clare was born into a family living in a small rural village in Northamptonshire. He was the son of a farm labourer and like Chris he lived his life with severe mental health problems. He spent time in what were then called asylums. This poem was written in such a place, the first 2 verses contain the sense of anguish Clare felt but the last verse has in it a sense of longing for the peace that lies beyond this troubled world, a place we might call heaven.

From the poem 'I am' by John Clare

I long for scenes where man hath never trod.
A place where woman never smiled or wept.
There to abide with my creator God,
And sleep as I in childhood sweetly slept,
Untroubling and untroubled where I lie
The grass below - above the vaulted sky

# DIARY DATE - FRIDAY 12TH JULY CONTEMPORARY ARTS PROJECT LAUNCH IN KINGSTON CHURCH FROM 6.30PM TO 8.30 PM WITH ARTISTS TALK AT 7.15PM

We are delighted to announce that on Friday 12th July a contemporary arts project will be launched in our church and will remain on display for the remainder of the summer.

Do come and learn about this exciting project at the official launch event when the artist, Bettina Furnée, will introduce the project and talk about the concepts and thinking behind her art.

The PCC were approached some 18 months ago by Art+Christianity, a charity which works closely with the Church Buildings Council, to broaden the understanding of the enormous range of art in churches and to develop links between contemporary art and the historical art in churches.

The project with Kingston has been conceived as one of two pilot projects in England, the other being in Newcastle, to explore effective ways to link contemporary art and artists to historical art in churches and to display contemporary art in churches. In this instance to link contemporary art to the church, its history, its fabric and its historic medieval wall paintings which span the period from the 13th to the 17th centuries.

After a careful, competitive, selection process the decision was taken to work with one of the resident studio artists at Wysing Arts, Bettina Furnée. We were delighted with Bettina's conceptual response to the Artists' Brief, which sought to commission new art which responded directly to Kingston church's wall paintings. A factor, although not the deciding factor, in choosing Bettina to undertake the commission was that she has previous experience of producing exciting work with Peterborough Cathedral.

The launch evening will provide an opportunity to not only learn about the thinking and background to the project and also to meet with representatives of Art+Christianity and The Church Buildings Council. Refreshments will be served from 6.30pm.

## Bourn Airfield New village - Draft SPD

The draft SPD is now completed. It's the document that sets out the proposed vision and masterplan for the new village. The Scrutiny Committee scrutinised it on 21st May and I attended to make the case for what turned out to be the main issues - the two accesses, potential for direct link to A428, transport provision, separation between the new village and Highfields, location of village centre and schools with respect to air quality. Read the minutes of the meeting at <a href="http://bit.ly/BADScrutiny">http://bit.ly/BADScrutiny</a> for full details. The committee made recommendations for improvement. Cabinet subsequently discussed the revised draft SPD and have given approval for it to go to public consultation.

The draft SPD should be available for public consultation from 17 June to 29 July 2019. Check the council website at <a href="https://www.scambs.gov.uk/bournairfieldspd/">https://www.scambs.gov.uk/bournairfieldspd/</a> for updates. There will be drop-in exhibitions/events that usually accompany this type of consultation. This is the stage where you can influence what gets built in the new settlement. Please make time to participate and share your views, comments etc.

#### **Zero Carbon Grant**

This is a new grant that the council is making available to community groups in the summer. Grants will be from £1,000 to £15,000, to spend on community projects that could help reduce carbon emissions, such as but not limited to solar panels, battery storage, electric vehicle charging points, tree planting, cycle paths & stands, recycling or helps to spread awareness and promote change in behaviour toward low carbon living. Watch out for more on this later when it is ready to receive bids/applications.

## **Book of the Month**

"When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit" by Judith Kerr.

It was sad to hear about the recent death of Judith Kerr, childrens' author extraordinaire. I feel that my family has lost an old friend. I read her book "Mog the Forgetful Cat" with my pre-school daughter and she, in turn, read Kerr's books with my grandson – "The Tiger Who Came to Tea" was an early favourite. The author had the unique knack of making naughtiness and upset OK parts of daily life – within bounds of course. She also never shied away from telling about the hard truths of life. In "Goodbye Mog", Mog the cat passes away and in one of her later books the central family is bombed out of their home during the blitz on London.

Judith Kerr was a German-born writer and illustrator. Born in 1923, in 1933 her family was forced to flee Hitler's Germany, first going to Switzerland and France but, in 1936, finally finding refuge in England. During the war she worked for the Red Cross before being awarded a scholarship to study at the Central School of Arts and Crafts at which point she became an artist. Having married Nigel Kneale (who wrote the cult TV science-fiction series "Quatermass" for the BBC) and starting a family, she decided to write books first and foremost for her own children. Having seen the film "The Sound of Music" with them, she decided to write the semiautobiographical "When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit" to let them know what it was really like in Nazi Germany. Eventually, she added two more books to form a trilogy describing life from the 1930s through to the 1950s. Pink Rabbit is a novel for older children (published in 1971) and is the unforgettable story of a Jewish family fleeing from Germany before the Second World War and has been called by Michael Morpurgo "the most life-enhancing book you could wish to read". The book starts when "Anna" (Judith's alter ego) is told that her beloved Papa has fled from Nazi Germany when he heard that his passport was about to be confiscated. Several days after that the rest of the family, Anna, her brother and her mother follow the father to Stuttgart and then on to Switzerland – and so their adventurous journey begins. As an aside, on the train to Zurich, they encounter a woman who is carrying a cat in her basket; the woman refers to the cat as her "mogger" – a nice nod to Kerr's books for younger children. Kerr has been described by friends as "sweet but steely"; kind, gentle, generous, funny, modest and diffident, she clearly had a harder side to her that resulted from her early life experiences as a survivor on the road to a new life outside Germany, so well described in Pink Rabbit.

Coincidentally, while rereading "When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit", I am also reading "Appeasing Hitler: Chamberlain, Churchill and the Road to War" by Tim Bouverie –

the story of how the policy of appeasement was implemented in the 1930s and how the well-meaning but slightly priggish, self-righteous and ultimately naïve Neville Chamberlain sold out Czechoslovakia and its western democratic allies in his earnest but misguided quest to keep the peace by any means - by giving in to Hitler's demands to annex the Sudetenland. This is a fascinating read and illuminates how the governing Tory party was rent apart by the issues surrounding Europe and appeasement. Surely this could never be repeated. Chamberlain always believed that public opinion supported appeasing Hitler and that it was the popular desire to keep the peace at any cost and not have a disastrous repeat of the Great War. In addition, as is explained in the book, large numbers of the British aristocracy were in sympathy with Hitler's regime and were more than prepared to ignore what was happening to the Jews in Germany – that is the very people like Judith Kerr and her family and their travails amidst what transpired to be Hitler's lunacy.

Learning in the classroom is supplemented by educational visits, which this year, have included Bletchley Park, the Tower of London, Hunstanton Sea Life Centre, the Chiltern Open Air Museum and the residential trips to Grafham Water and Rock UK. We have also been very lucky in school to have had a number of visitors that have been in to talk to the children about many exciting subjects from swimming the channel to healthy living. We are so grateful that people are willing to give up their time to widen the children's knowledge and experiences. Within school, the children are given a wide range of opportunities, designed to stretch their imaginations and increase their interests. These include a variety of after school clubs run by teachers, a choir and orchestra, many sporting activities and the chance to represent the school in competitions such as the Public Speaking Challenge, Spelling Bee and Mega Maths Challenge.

Bourn Primary is not immune to the financial pressures being suffered by schools across the country. Each year we receive less funding from the government per pupil and our costs; such as salaries, pension costs, utility bills etc. continue to rise. We work very hard to manage these pressures whilst continuing to provide the best quality education to our pupils but this becomes more challenging year on year.

We are lucky to be supported by the Bourn School Association, a dedicated group of parents who raise money for the school through a range of activities including a Bingo night, a Gin Tasting evening, the Summer BBQ and of course, Bourn to Run. We are immensely grateful to everyone who has organised or supported these events because the money raised has meant that we have been able to buy essential equipment for the children. This year, the BSA have provided us with the funds to buy ten laptops, two interactive whiteboards, a new phonics scheme and subscription to a cross-curricular website which enables the children to access a wide range of educational tools and games. We have also been able to replenish our stock of reading books — although we will always need more!

We are very grateful for all those involved in organising the wide range of activities that the children benefit from.

As we come to the end of the academic year, we are preparing to welcome our new 'little Acorns', some of whom are so ready for school they want to start now! We are also getting ready to say farewell to our Year 6 children. This is an emotional time and I am sure I speak for all members of the school staff when I say it has been an honour and a privilege to have been involved in educating and supporting them to achieve their best and to be ready to take on the exciting next stage of their education.

Happy holidays - let's hope the sun shines!

## Heidi Allen's Newsletter

Before I launch into my usual monthly constituency update, I thought it important to explain what has happened recently in terms of my own party allegiance. As you will know, I left the Conservative Party in February to sit as an Independent MP because I was concerned the Party had drifted to the right and it was more concerned with its own survival than the national interest. Early polling results gave us, as Independents, the confidence to formalise into a party structure, named "Change UK" to fight the European elections at the end of May. However it soon became clear that the Brexit Party was storming ahead. Believing passionately that the National interest must always come first, and that Nigel Farage did not have the right answers for the country's future, I felt our support should shift to other Remain parties who were faring better than us in the polls.

I was unable to convince a majority of Change UK MPs of this strategy and they remained steadfastly of the opinion that the party should seek to achieve votes for itself rather than collaborate with other parties

Now the European elections are over, I remain unwavering in my strong belief that the country must always come first. As such, I have stepped down from Change UK and returned to sit once again as an Independent with four other colleagues – Sarah Wollaston, Luciana Berger, Angela Smith and Gavin Shuker.

There are two principal reasons as to why I have done this.

I do not believe I can serve my constituents and country well if I put party interests ahead of theirs.

Secondly, the political landscape remains very volatile. In the coming weeks and months I can easily envisage MPs leaving the Conservative Party because they cannot tolerate a new Prime Minister who advocates a hard Brexit or no deal Brexit. Equally, there are Labour colleagues who will no longer tolerate Jeremy Corbyn's inability to fight as an opposition leader should.

Recognising that it is very difficult for MPs to leave their parties and immediately join other ones, I believe my role will be to help convene a safe neutral space in the centre ground of Parliament and offer a home for those MPs. It will allow us to work alongside the Liberal Democrats, Greens, SNP, Change UK and Plaid Cymru in the national interest, ensuring we do not crash out of the EU with no deal.

As an Independent MP with a reputation for cross party working and prioritising the national interest over party allegiance, I feel strongly that I will be able to help act as a convener.

It is my strong belief that this is what the country needs right now.

## **Music Corner**

### My Generation

While eating dinner in a restaurant recently, Kay and I were serenaded by a tape of George Michael singing extended versions of some of his major hits like "Father Figure" and "Don't Let The Sun Go Down on Me" with Elton John. Good stuff. That got me thinking about all the rock stars, like George Michael, who have died recently. There was a time when we didn't expect our rock idols to keep their star status into their '70s. Rock stars, we thought, have to be young by definition. Then, to our surprise, they did make it and continued to make great music – and, like Mick Jagger, are having to undergo surgery to keep them going! Some, of course, the latest being the Night Tripper himself, Dr. John, are reaching old age and beyond. Some like Prince and David Bowie didn't make it that far. So, presumably, we can expect more A-list septuagenarians to hit the headlines as their bodies fail to resist the ravages of time.

One band that never shied from excess and the resulting high mortality rate is The Who. Now down to two of the original members, there is a wonderful video of the remaining duo playing live on "The Tonight Show starring Jimmy Fallon" on a recent edition on NBC television in the USA. This time around, however, along with Jimmy Fallon himself and the members of his house band (The Roots), Roger Daltrey and Pete Townshend are all playing toy instruments like tiny tambourines, xylophones, maracas, etc. Pete Townshend is playing a tiny toy guitar which, in time-honoured style, he smashes to pieces at the end of the piece. The song is "Won't Get Fooled Again" and, perhaps surprisingly given the instruments being used, the number really rocks! I highly recommend finding the video on YouTube. The music is fun, joyful, outrageous – and extremely out there. Yet compulsive viewing.

Yet, like Van Morrison before them, I'd given up on The Who. After reading Pete Townshend's dire, self-serving and self-righteous autobiography (which, I must admit, I couldn't finish), I'd jettisoned them from my play list. The problem with rock music and rock stars is just because we like a lot of their music we want to like them as people - they often don't deserve to be liked. Putting that issue to one side, however, I have overcome my misgivings and prompted by the freshness and sheer bravura of the recent video, I've gone back to their original music and paid due homage to its greatness. After all, they are very much my generation. Rising from the r&b music and mod scene of the mid to late '60s, The Who (previously the Detours and the High Numbers) produced a staggering string of hits starting with "I Can't Explain", the glorious "My Generation", and the equally stupendous

"Substitute" and then continuing with "Happy Jack", "I'm a Boy", and "Pictures of Lily", and climaxing with "I Can See for Miles" and the superb "Tommy" LP. This is an unprecedented string of great hit music. Strangely, my favourite track of the lot is their uncharacteristic song from Tommy, "See Me Feel Me", a huge hit in the states but not in the UK, which starts slowly, gradually builds in intensity, and only explodes in typical Who-style at the very end. If they had stopped recording there and then, they could be said to have produced some of the finest rock music of all time. Yet they continued to produce fine songs – including the aforementioned "Won't get Fooled Again". Much of their music is quirky, odd-ball and humorous. They know when not to take themselves too seriously (which is partly why Townshend's book is so disappointing) and which is why their recent video perfectly captures their mood of self-deprecating rapture. Long live The Who! Long live my generation! Thinking about it, I wonder if they still stand by their immortal words "I hope I die before I get old (Talkin' 'bout my generation)".






## **Govia Thameslink Railway Passenger Benefit Fund**

We are delighted to announce the launch of the engagement process of Govia Thameslink Railway's (GTR's) £15 million Passenger Benefit Fund which aims to provide tangible improvements for passengers on the GTR network. The fund was established following the disruption experienced by passengers during the implementation of the May 2018 timetable.

The Secretary of State nominated Bim Afolami, Henry Smith and Heidi Allen, as MPs representing different parts of the GTR network, to work with GTR and develop a plan for how the fund is allocated and consulted on. The MPs asked for decisions on how the Fund was spent to be made at as local level as possible. The fund, therefore has been allocated to passengers based on the tiers of the additional industry compensation scheme which were agreed following the disruption caused by the May 2018 timetable issues. Passengers at stations across the network have been allocated either £30,000,£50,000 or £80,000 to spend on station improvements or on a wider benefit scheme.

We are engaging with passengers, MPs, passenger groups and councils to understand how they would like the money to be spent. Stakeholders will be asked to prioritise ideas ready for a selection and approval process starting in August.
