Vicar's Letter

"So long, farewell, auf Wiedersehen, goodbye". So sang the von Trapp children as they somewhat reluctantly left their father's dinner party.

As you will know, during August I will be saying 'goodbye' to the Papworth Team of churches where I've lived and ministered now for just over 14 years.

Goodbye is a tough word: it's the same word we say to those we shall meet again tomorrow, and those we shall never meet again in this life. Every goodbye in this life is in some ways a practice for our ultimate goodbye at the end of this life. So it's understandable when someone says "I don't like goodbyes".

But every goodbye is also a hello. I will be moving to a new set of congregations, communities, schools, joys, and challenges. I will be taking with me all that I've learned in the Papworth Team: good things that I will try again, and mistakes I most definitely won't! For the Three Rivers Group this goodbye will be their hello as we embark together on a new season in their church life.

The word 'goodbye' originated from the phrase "God be with you" – condensing over centuries, as commonly used phrases often do, into its present form.

It recalls for me the words of Psalm 139: "O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You search out my path, and are acquainted with all my ways." And again "If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast."

I'm only moving to the farthest limits of Cambridgeshire, but it's still true that wherever I go, whatever I do, I know that God – the same unchanging, loving God – is there ahead of me.

Every goodbye is also a hello, and that applies to the very last one as well: Psalm 139 envisages waking from the last sleep and finding oneself still in God's presence. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God has transformed every 'goodbye' into the possibility of an endless 'hello'.

In that knowledge, I can look back with gratitude on the last 14 years, and look ahead with confidence to the years ahead. In the words of Dag Hammarskjöld, former UN Secretary General: "For all that has been, Thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!"




Across Cambridgeshire and the country on 9 September 2023.



Cannabis

Throughout June, Cambridgeshire police located and searched 19 suspected cannabis grows in places including Peterborough, Chatteris, Ramsey and St Neots, seizing 3,555 cannabis plants worth more than £3 million as well as seizing more than £30,000 in cash and £100,000 worth of growing equipment.

An imitation firearm was also recovered and one vulnerable adult safeguarded and referred through the National Referral Mechanism.

Four men aged 21, 31, 36 and 37 from Peterborough, were arrested and have since been charged with offences including production of cannabis, criminal damage, possess/ control identity documents with intent and possession of an offensive weapon in a private place.

Five further men were arrested for offences including production of cannabis and possession of an offensive weapon. They have been bailed and released under investigation while investigations continue.

How you can help:

There are some key signs to spot a property that could be being used as a cannabis factory:

- Frequent visitors to a property at unsocial hours throughout the day and night
- Blacked out windows or condensation on the windows, even when it is not cold outside
- Bright lights in rooms throughout the night
- Electricity meters being tampered with/altered and new cabling, sometimes leading to street lighting. High electricity bills can also be an indicator
- A powerful, distinctive, sweet, sickly aroma and noise from fans
- Lots of work or deliveries of equipment to an address, particularly those associated with growing plants indoors without soil such as heaters and lighting
- An excessive amount of plant pots, chemicals, fertilisers and compost

Reading 89% (national 73%) Writing 78% (national 71%) Maths 81% (national 73%) Spelling, punctuation and grammar 81% (national 72%) Combined Reading, Writing and Maths 74% (national 59%)
