Vicar's Letter:

Congratulations on surviving January, and welcome to February. What has changed? In many ways, not very much. Winter is still very much with us. And yet, if you look closely, there are small signs that things are shifting. The days are just a touch longer than they were, the light lingers a little later in the afternoon, and progress, though slow, is quietly being made.

This time of year often calls for patience. Things don't suddenly feel new just because the calendar has moved on, and life rarely changes in straight lines. Much of the time, we're simply getting on with what's in front of us, trusting that something is slowly growing beneath the surface, even when it isn't obvious yet.

There's a line in the Psalms that has stayed with me: 'The Lord is my light and my salvation'. It doesn't promise that everything will suddenly become easy or clear. Instead, it speaks of a light that is steady and reliable, something to walk by rather than something that dazzles. That feels about right for February. 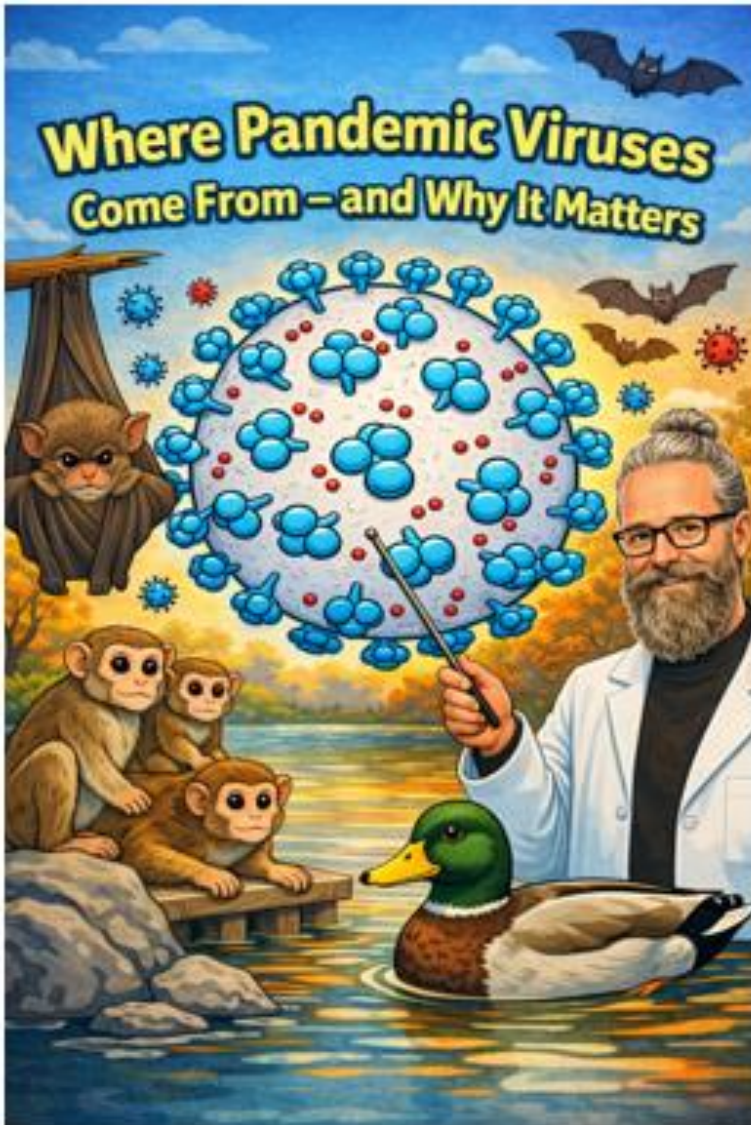

As the Parish Council looks towards 2026, there is a need to fill the role of Parish Clerk and shape the future of the community assets such as the Play Park and the Orchard.

One is to appoint a Parish Clerk, a paid post, who, by administering, informing, recording and otherwise, enables the Parish Council to function. The other task is to add additional Parish Councillors to our existing numbers. The belief is that sufficient village residents can see the benefit of stepping forward and stand for election to the Parish Council in 2026.

The current Council, who meet regularly six times a year, with occasional additional meetings to discuss urgent issues such as Planning Applications, have been set an example to follow by our previous counterparts, who fostered an environment where more residents felt empowered and inspired to be part of the Parish Council. We wish to continue in their footsteps by encouraging individuals to make positive choices. Standing for election is both an opportunity for personal development and an act of community service.

As I am sure that you are aware, Parish Councillors play a vital role in speaking up for residents and getting things done locally. By joining the Council, you can help decide how resources are used, influence improvements, and ensure your community's voice is heard.

Hopefully, the mantra of "people like me can and do serve" will be heard and we can move forward together. Kingston deserves an efficient and effective Parish Council, and with your contribution this can be continued.

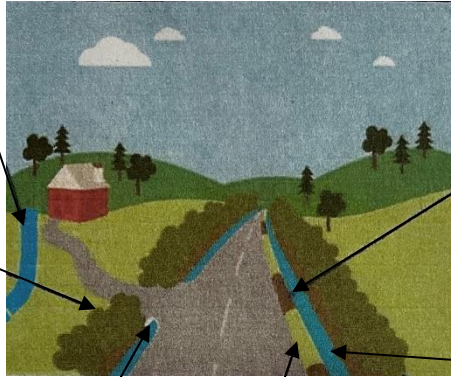

Responsibilities for Rural Drainage

Ordinary watercourse:
Responsibility of adjacent landowner or Local District Council if it has 'Awarded' status. Sometimes in an Internal Drainage Board (IDB) catchment it can be the IDB.



Highway Grip: this is a drainage channel dug through the verge between the highway and the ditch. Responsibility of Highways Authority for maintenance.

Roadside ditch: responsibility of adjacent landowner for maintenance

Roadside hedges and trees: Responsibility of adjacent landowner for maintenance.

Piped Ditch: Ditches are often piped/culverted to provide access. Responsibility of adjacent landowner for maintenance.

Verge: Responsibility of the Highways Authority for maintenance.



Church finances and appeal for standing orders

Kingston Parochial Church Council anticipates that its annual running expenses for 2026 will amount to around £18,000, while income is expected to be £12,000. That leaves a shortfall of £6,000. (This is quite apart from the costs of maintaining and repairing the fabric of the church, a Grade I Listed Building.)

The church in Kingston has always been maintained – for the best part of a thousand years – by the generosity of parishioners. As the number of services each month, and the number of people attending them, have declined, income from collections has become relatively insignificant, amounting now to less than £1,000 per annum. The PCC established a relatively modest Endowment Fund in 2016, and the interest on this gives us about £2,500. The Parish Council pays for the costs of producing the Parish and Church magazine (£850), and also for cutting the grass in the churchyard (£850). By far the most significant source of revenue for us is the contribution made by about 15 people who subscribe monthly donations by standing order (and we acknowledge this with sincere thanks): with Gift Aid added this gives us about £5,000 each year. The rest has to be made up by fund raising events and we are planning for a Gift Day (11th July, subject to confirmation) and concerts for 2026.

Over the last decade we have lost almost half of those subscribing by standing order (several of whom, incidentally, had no church affiliation). If we were able to recruit 20 more individuals willing to give £25 per month, that would amount to £6,000 (more with Gift Aid added): our deficit would be resolved; our budget would balance. We could then concentrate fund raising activities on the church building where there are always outstanding repairs requiring attention. The PCC will be writing to all households in the parish inviting new subscriptions.

You may well ask, what are we getting for our money? Nothing less than a living church in this place which endeavours to offer the full mission of the Church of England, as required by law: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The mission is by definition for everyone here, of all faiths and of none. All are welcome to our services of worship; our church is open every day for prayer and reflection. The sacraments of baptism and marriage are still administered and celebrated here; all parishioners have the right to Christian burial. Our clergy are very much involved with our Church of England Schools, including Bourn Primary Academy. Anyone in sickness or trouble or in any spiritual need should be reassured that they should have no hesitation in contacting one of our clergy team (the Revds Nigel Pearson or Matt Phillips).

The Papworth Team (to which Kingston belongs) has recently been designated a 'Growing Faith Hub' and has been able to secure some additional funding from the Diocese of Ely. Several initiatives for young families have been introduced: Messy Church, at the moment held in Bourn, Papworth and Elsworth for families but everyone welcome; Little Dragons, for under-5s, at Pendragon School in Papworth; an informal weekly Evening Worship at Pendrill Court in Papworth. As this issue goes to press, the Team is interviewing candidates for two new posts: a full-time Youth and Young Adults Minister and a part-time Children and Families Minister. Also, there should be a new member of clergy appointed soon, who will live in the Bourn rectory.

More than ever we all need meaning, purpose, acceptance, community. The Gospel of Jesus Christ, which the church proclaims, is an invitation to discover all these. The gift beyond price is eternal life.

Weekly food waste collections

Weekly food waste collections will be introduced in phases throughout 2026. Collections in Kingston begin in June 2026. You'll receive a letter in May with details and caddy delivery information. Closer to the time, you'll see collection dates appear on your bin collection schedule. Schedules could be subject to change, so check back for further updates.

All households will receive a letter with full details a few weeks before the service begins in their area to help ensure they are prepared.

Before their new collections begin, households will receive a new outdoor caddy to put out for collection at the kerbside with their wheelie bins each week, as well as a smaller indoor caddy to collect food waste in the kitchen. The weekly food waste collections will take place on residents' usual bin days.

Food waste collected from the new weekly service will be processed at an Anaerobic Digestion plant. This captures the gases released as the food breaks down and uses them to generate electricity. Fertiliser is also produced which can be used on farmland.

Kingston Parish Playpark Restoration

The Parish Council plans to start a restoration project on the Playpark. The purpose is to restore the land to the standard that was set when the area was first established.

The activity to be undertaken will include, but not be limited to:

The reduction of the hedges, to the fence height, along the eastern and southern perimeter of the Playpark. The removal of grass, weeds and tree roots from the play park surrounding the Spider Frame. The reduction in height of the willow tree structure. The strimming of the mound containing the Tunnel and the Slide Tube. The pruning of the sole apple tree. The reduction in height, where practicable, of the northern boundary hedge. The return to vertical of the Bridleway sign.

The plan is for the work to be progressively undertaken, on a weekly basis, when it is not raining, every Monday morning between 10:30 and 12:00. If you have the expertise, time and suitable tools, your contribution would be more than welcome.

The Playpark is a valuable asset and deserves to be maintained to the standard set by the founding Parish members. Improvements can then follow for the benefits to all that use the facility, and the nearby residents.

Dog Poo Bags

It has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council that there continues to be an issue with dogs being allowed to foul areas within the Parish.

As all responsible dog owners will know you must never leave your dog's poo anywhere, even in a bag, it can cause illness in people, livestock, and wildlife.

The Parish Council has located several public waste bins that can be used to deposit any bagged dog poo. When there are no bins, please be a responsible dog owner and use your bin at home.

Dog fouling in public is covered in the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act of 2014.

Places covered by the Public Space Protection Order include:

- Parks, playing fields, and playgrounds
- Town centres, shopping centres and car parks
- Footpaths, pavements and roads

It is worth noting that Councils can and sometimes do implement district-wide bans on people for allowing dog fouling.

Show that you are a responsible dog owner and BAG it and BIN it.
